Its modular design affords versatile configurations for handling up to eight different inputs of virtually any type.* Industry-leading support for HDCP ensures compatibility with content protected DVD, Blu-ray Disc®, digital HDTV and multimedia computer sources. Advanced high definition image processing achieves astounding realism and detail for every input signal, with the ability to display up to eight separate video images at once or switch fluently between them using alluring digital transition effects and customizable graphics.

The Guidebar resides conveniently at the top, bottom or sides of the presenter’s screen without obscuring the video image, allowing immediate access to all the annotation tools, plus buttons for audio volume, source selection, transport control and room lighting. Just like any Crestron touch screen, the Guidebar is completely customizable for any appearance or functionality and is only visible to the presenter, so the audience sees just the full screen video image with annotations.

HD Annotation

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB provides the essential annotation tools to make a point with maximum impact, easily and intuitively. Brush sizes and colors are selectable on the fly for ultimate clarity. Moving images can be frozen on screen to allow pinpoint annotation over a still picture. Annotation over two or more different sources at once is possible, for easy side by side comparison of multiple related images. High definition annotation processing guarantees both the presenter and the audience sees everything in crisp detail.

Interactive Annotation

Crestron exclusive Remote Annotation capability lets up to 90 individual touch screen users “mass annotate” over the same image, supporting efficient and effective interaction between participants in a classroom, courtroom, council chamber, operating room or command center.

HDCP Management

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is the first annotation processor of its kind that handles HDCP (High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection) to work with a complete range of digital video players, cable and satellite receivers, multimedia computers, displays and projectors, now and into the future. While other manufacturers ignore HDCP completely, the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB actually performs advanced HDCP signal management, allowing up to eight HDCP encrypted sources to be combined on one high definition screen along with non-HDCP sources, graphics and live annotation.

More and more content providers are using HDCP to protect their DVDs, Blu-ray Discs, broadcast signals and online content against unauthorized copying. Analog connectivity, which cannot support HDCP, is being eliminated from the computers and AV equipment being sold today and soon, content providers are taking full advantage of the new digital technology to ensure only authorized users may view their content in all its high definition glory. Systems that do not support HDCP simply do not allow display of all this HD content.

QuickSwitch HD

Crestron exclusive QuickSwitch HD[®] technology eliminates the annoying latency and blanking that plagues other digital annotators and switchers. Switching between inputs of any type is fast and fluid on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB. Video images can even fade or fly in and out over a personalized background using digital transition effects and customizable graphics, lending enhanced flow and vibe to the total presentation.

Multiformat Support

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is custom configurable to accommodate a full range of input signal types.¹ Any resolution up to 1920 x 1200² can be supported, with an incredible 125 pre-defined “standard” resolutions and the ability to define any custom resolution. Available inputs include:

- **HDMI** – Supports high definition digital video with HDCP and Deep Color. Handles resolutions up to HD 1080p60 or 1080i30 and WUXGA 1920 x 1200. Each HDMI input includes a complementary HDMI output to pass the incoming video and audio signals through to another HDMI device. HD Display Outputs

Separate DVI-I outputs are provided for the audience display and presenter's touch screen. Each output can support a DVI, HDMI or analog RGB signal at any resolution up to 1920 x 1200. To enable Guidebar functionality, the presenter's touch screen simply needs to have a higher resolution than the audience display. For instance, a 1920 x 1200 pixel touch screen can display a 1080p (1920 x 1080) video image, with the Guidebar occupying the remaining 120 rows of pixels above or below the video image. The audience, viewing on a 1080p display, sees just the full screen 1080p video image. So, everyone enjoys the same full resolution HD video image while only the presenter sees the Guidebar controls.^{1, 2, 3, 4, 5}

Vast Touch Screen Support

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is compatible with more touch screen displays than any other annotator or video processor on the market. Many dozens of models are supported from numerous manufacturers, with more being added all the time. With a vast array of sizes available in a variety of tabletop, flush mount and other specialized configurations, there is sure to be a solution that is perfect for any custom application.⁶

Advanced Image Processing

Among annotators, the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is also a venerable video processor and scaler in its own right, scaling its output perfectly to match the native resolution and aspect ratio of a high definition display. VXP[®] video processing with fully adaptive deinterlacing achieves exceptional realism and rich detail from standard definition, high definition and computer sources.

Auto-Configuration

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is easy to install, configuring itself automatically to match all the different sources and displays as they are connected. Input sync detection sets the optimum format, resolution and scan rate for each source⁷, while EDID (Extended Display Identification Data) adapts the output to match the connected display device. Manual adjustments and built-in test patterns are also available to allow fine adjustment of every input and output when desired.

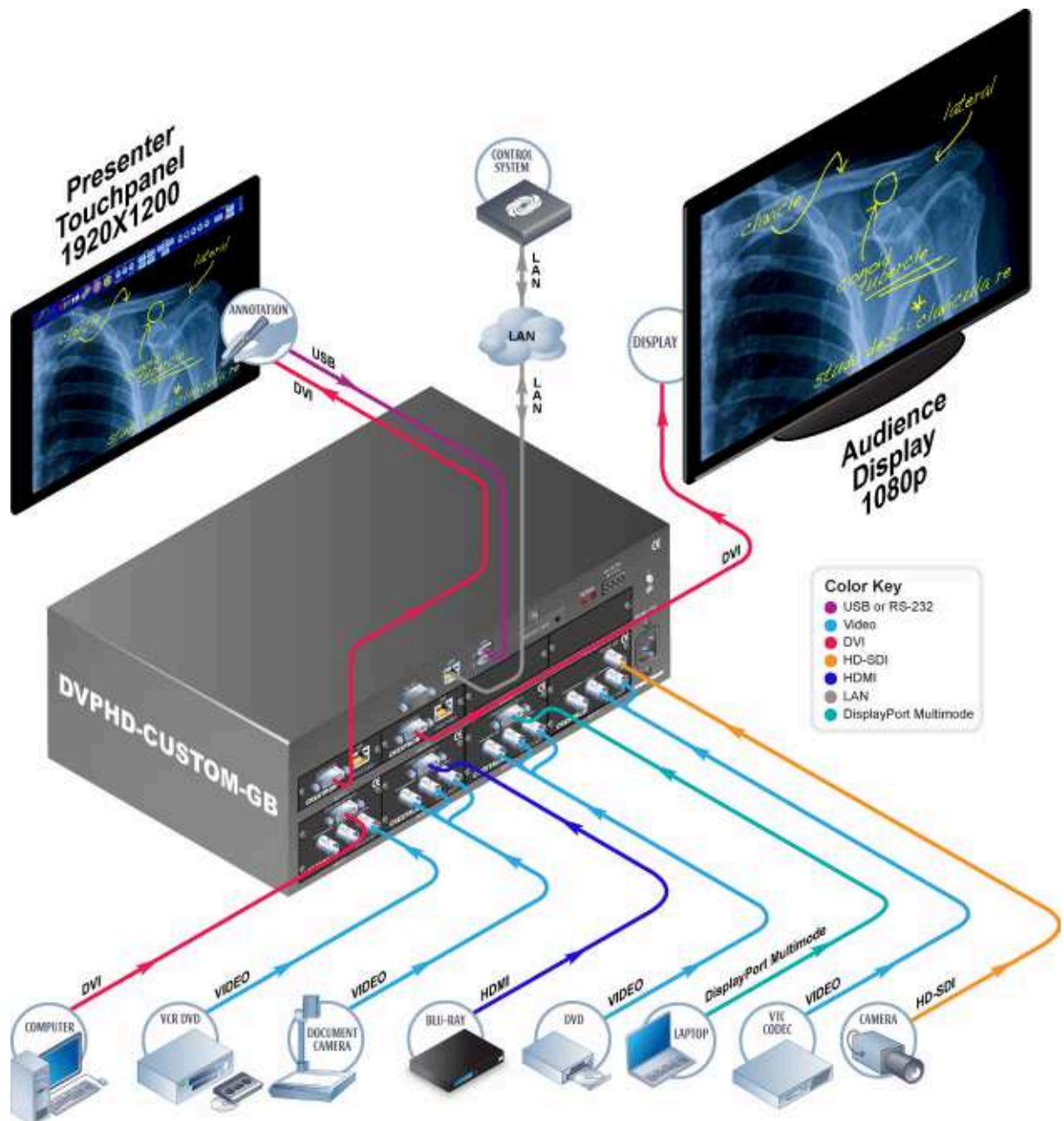
System Integration

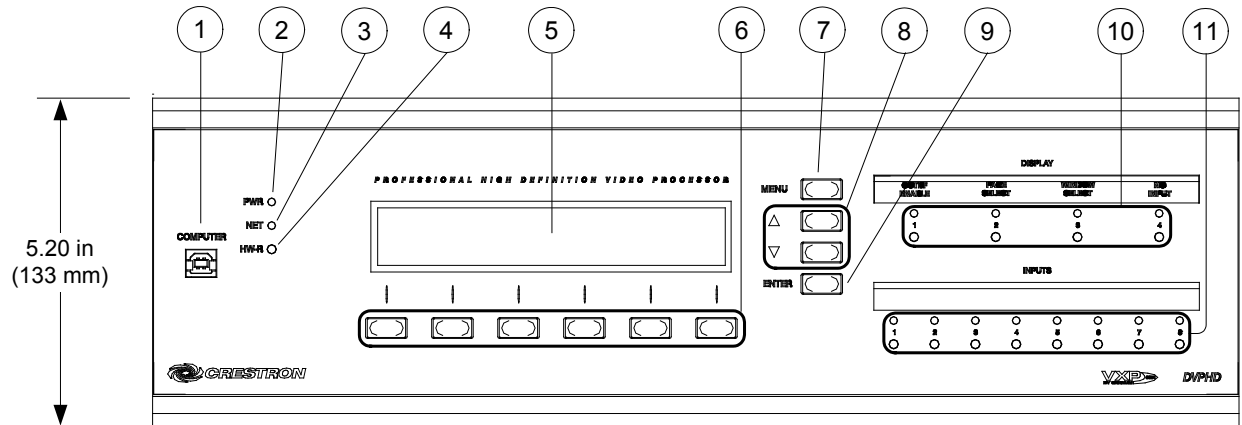
DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB Physical View (Front)



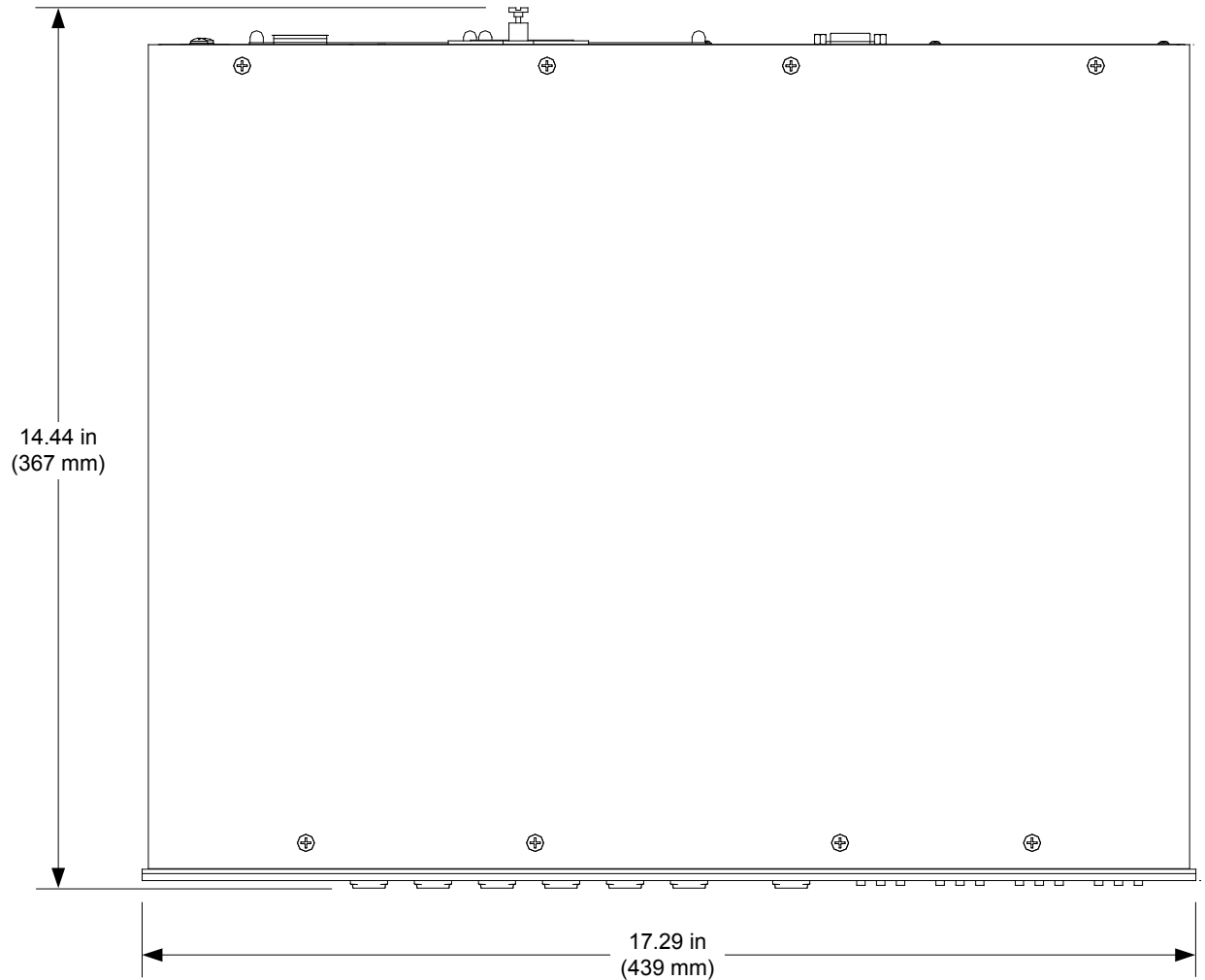
DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB Physical View (Rear)



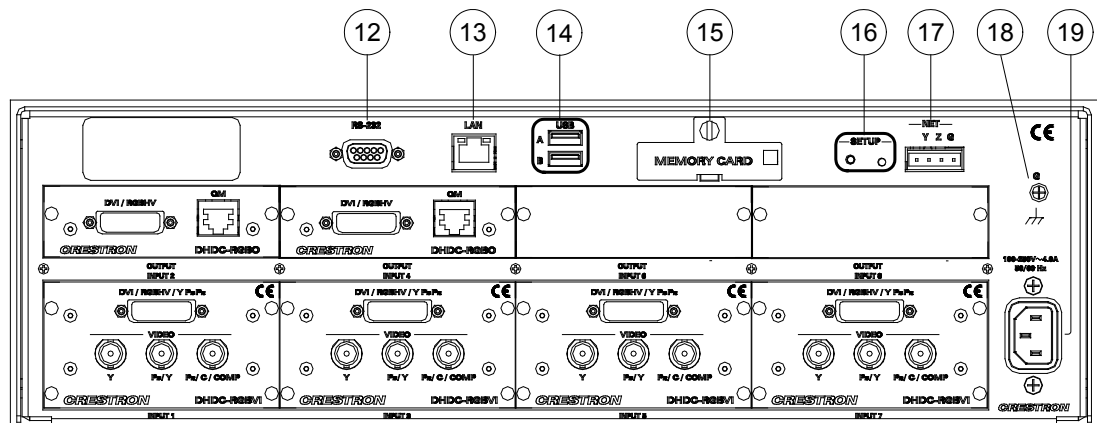
DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB Overall Dimensions (Front View)

DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB Overall Dimensions (Rear View)

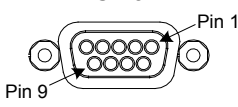
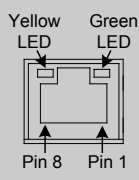

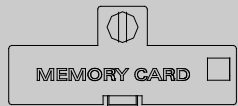

Setup

Network Wiring

When wiring the Cresnet and Ethernet network, consider the following:

- Use Crestron Certified Wire.
- Use Crestron power supplies for Crestron equipment.
- Provide sufficient power to the system.

CAUTION: Insufficient power can lead to unpredictable results or damage to the equipment. Please use the Crestron Power Calculator to help calculate how much power is needed for the system (www.crestron.com/calculators).

For Cresnet networks with 20 or more devices, use a Cresnet Hub/Repeater (CNXHUB) to maintain signal quality.

For more details, refer to “Check Network Wiring” on page 85.

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can also use high-speed Ethernet for communications between the device and a control system, computer, digital media server and other IP-based devices.

For information on connecting Ethernet devices in a Crestron system, refer to the Crestron e-Control[®] Reference Guide (Doc. 6052), at www.crestron.com/manuals.

Identity Code

NOTE: The latest software can be downloaded from the Crestron Web site (www.crestron.com/software).

Net ID

The Net ID of the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB has been factory set to **03**. The Net IDs of multiple DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB devices in the same system must be unique. Net IDs are changed from a personal computer (PC) via the Crestron Toolbox™ (refer to “Establishing Communication” on page 44).

When setting the Net ID, consider the following:

- The Net ID of each unit must match an ID code specified in the Crestron Studio™ or SIMPL Windows program.
- Each network device must have a unique Net ID.

For more details, refer to the Crestron Toolbox help file.

IP ID

The IP ID is set within the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB’s IP table using Crestron Toolbox. For information on setting an IP table, refer to the Crestron Toolbox help file. The IP IDs of multiple DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB devices in the same system must be unique.

When setting the IP ID, consider the following:

- The IP ID of each unit must match an IP ID specified in the Crestron Studio or SIMPL Windows program.
- Each device using IP to communicate with a control system must have a unique IP ID.

Configuring the Video Processor

NOTE: In order to configure the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB, power and a connection to an external touch screen or a connection via Ethernet are required. Refer to “Hardware Hookup” on page 42 for details.

To configure the unit, it may be necessary to access a series of setup menus prior to viewing run-time screens that are loaded into the interface for normal operation. The method for accessing these setup menus differs depending on whether an external touch screen or an Ethernet connection is used.

To enter Setup via the Web interface:

Enter the IP address provided for the video processor on the network. The e-Control[®], XPanel interface is displayed. Click on the **Setup** button.

To enter Setup via the touch screen:

Place a finger on the touch screen, left click the mouse or press the **Display 1** front panel button as power is applied or after the hardware reset button is pressed and released. Remove the finger when the message "Entering Setup. Please wait while system initializes." briefly appears on the touch screen.

To enter Setup via the front panel menu:

Access Setup by pressing the **Enter** front panel button. Select *ENTER/EXIT SETUP PAGE* and press **B5 (SAVE)**.

Upon entering Setup, the “Main Menu”, as shown in the following illustration, displays five buttons: **Touch Screen Calibration**, **Reboot and Run Program**, **Exit Setup and Run Program**, **Setup** and **Diagnostics**.

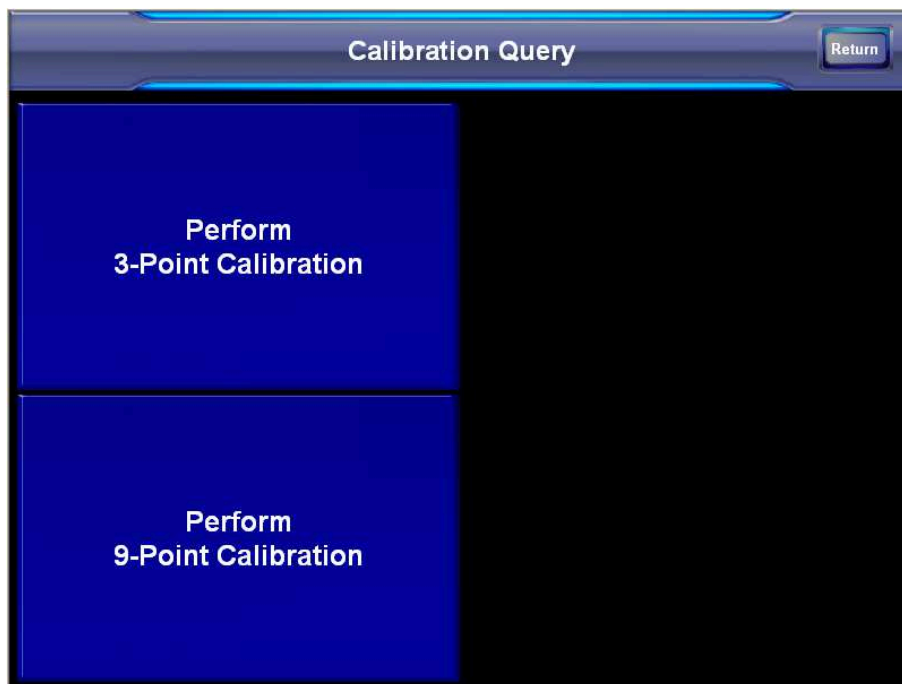
The **Exit and Run Program** button verifies that all of the setup information has been saved to the EEPROM and displays the main page that has been programmed into the system. The remaining buttons on the “Main Menu” open other menus, which are discussed in subsequent paragraphs.

Touch **Touch Screen Calibration** on the “Main Menu” and then either **Perform 3-Point Calibration** or **Perform 9-Point Calibration** on the “Calibration Query” menu. The message “Touch Upper Left” appears centered on the panel with a cross hair in the upper left corner. Touch the center of the cross hair in the corner of the screen to initiate calibration. Another message, “Touch Upper Right”, appears with a cross hair in the correct corner. Touch the center of the cross hair in the corner of the screen. A final message, “Touch Lower Right”, appears with a cross hair in the correct corner. Touch the center of the cross hair in the corner of the screen to conclude calibration and return to the “Main Menu”.

NOTE: It is not possible to calibrate a touch screen if a USB mouse is connected or the RS-232 port is set to **Mouse Input**.

NOTE: When touching the screen during calibration, be as accurate as possible. Use the tip of a capped pen or the eraser end of a pencil. To cancel calibration and return to the “Calibration Query” menu without saving calibration data, create a calibration error by touching the screen in the same spot three times for 3-Point Calibration or nine times for 9-Point Calibration. The system can also be allowed to timeout by touching nothing for one minute.

NOTE: During calibration, the point where the screen is touched is recorded when the screen is released rather than when it is first touched. This makes it possible to be more accurate when touching the screen because the user can ensure they are centered on the cross hairs before releasing.

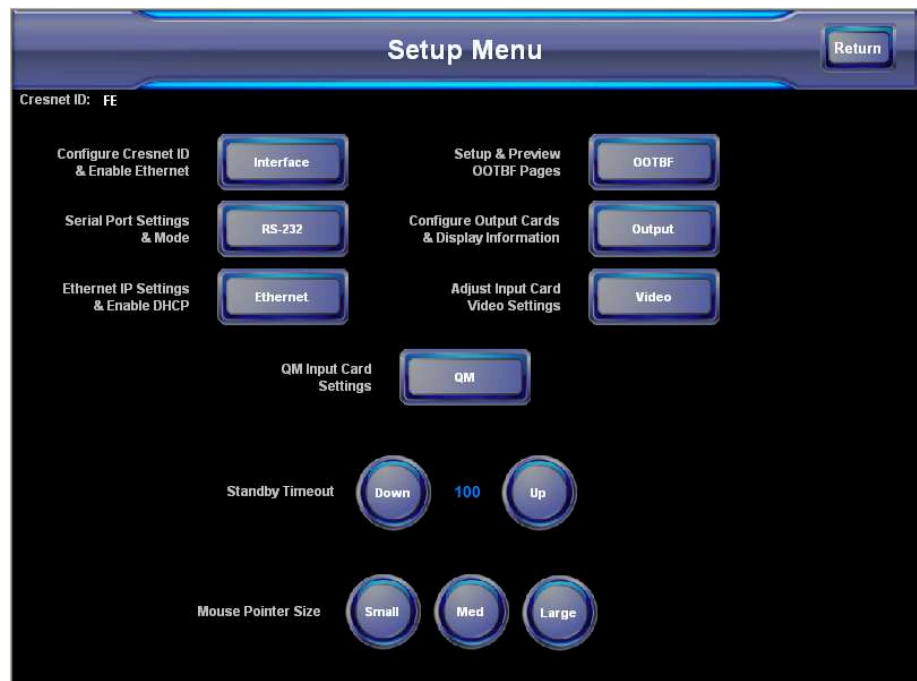
Setup Menu

To open the “Setup Menu”, touch **Setup** on the “Main Menu”. The “Setup Menu” offers a series of buttons, which open additional menus and displays and are detailed in subsequent paragraphs. The “Setup Menu” also provides the *Standby Timeout* setting and *Mouse Pointer Size* controls. After setup parameters have been selected, touch **Return** to return to the “Main Menu”.

NOTE: For convenience, the current *Cresnet ID* setting is displayed in the upper left corner of the screen.

NOTE: All DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB Video Processor settings are automatically saved in non-volatile memory.

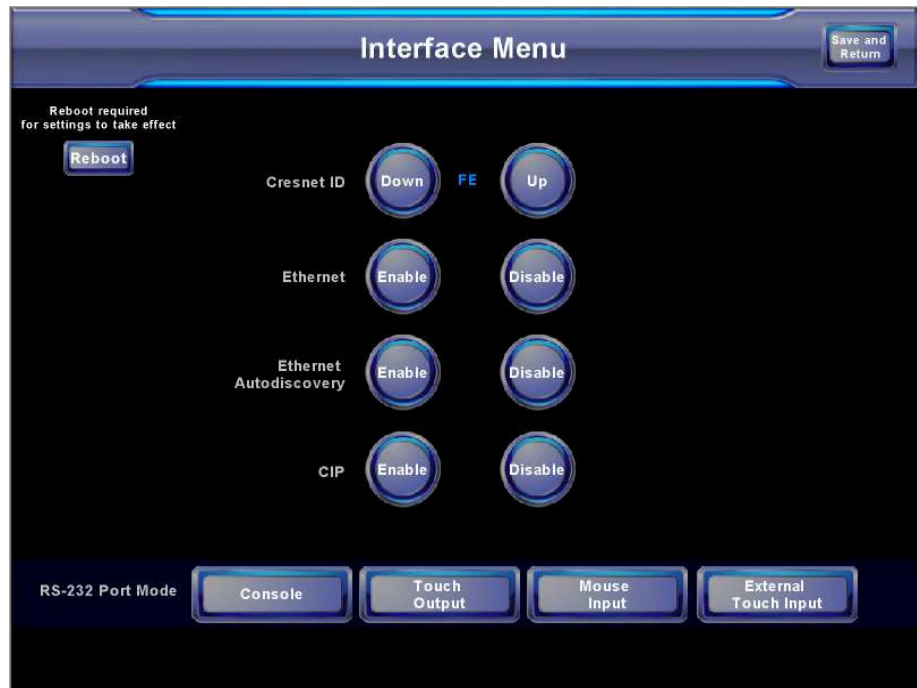

Interface Menu

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB communicates with a control system to activate commands or to display feedback from components within the system. The communication interface must be correctly configured or communication does not occur. To set communication parameters, touch **Interface** on the “Setup Menu” to display the “Interface Menu”.

The Cresnet network identity number (*Cresnet ID* also known as the Net ID) is displayed on the “Interface Menu”. Cresnet ID is the two-digit hexadecimal number. The hexadecimal number can range from 03 to FE and must correspond to the Net ID set in the SIMPL Windows program of the Cresnet system. Matching IDs between the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB and the SIMPL Windows program is required if data is to be successfully transferred. Net ID for the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is factory set to **03**. No two devices in the same system can have the same Net ID.

“Interface Menu”

Two buttons adjacent to the *Cresnet ID* and its displayed hexadecimal number, **Down** and **Up**, decrease and increase the *Cresnet ID* by one, respectively.

The *Ethernet* **Enable** and **Disable** buttons select the status of the device’s Ethernet communications.

The *Ethernet Autodiscovery* **Enable** and **Disable** buttons select the status of the device’s ability to determine the state and shape of the network and the devices attached to the network. Autodiscovery is enabled by default when the local system setup (not Web setup) is active.

There may be Ethernet devices (such as a control system) on the network that communicate with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB via CIP (Cresnet Internet Protocol). The *CIP* buttons, located on the “Interface Menu”, select whether the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is set to perform this type of communication. Select **Enable** to permit this protocol recognition and **Disable** to prohibit any CIP connection. *CIP* must be enabled for the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB to communicate with other Crestron Ethernet devices.

The four buttons on the bottom of the menu define how the RS-232 port is used: as a console port (such as loading DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB projects and firmware), a touch output port (communication of touch coordinates to an external device), a mouse input port (allowing a mouse to control the interface) and an external touch input (allowing another device to control the touch screen).

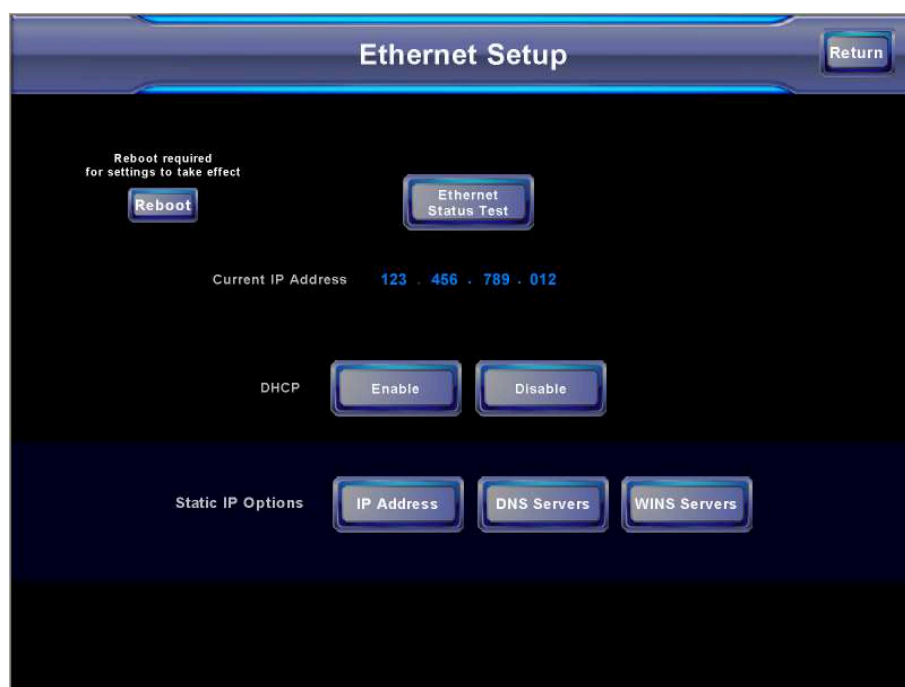
Touch **Save and Return** to save changes and return to the “Setup Menu” if additional changes are intended. Touch **Reboot** to save the settings and restart the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB if no other changes are required.

Ethernet Setup

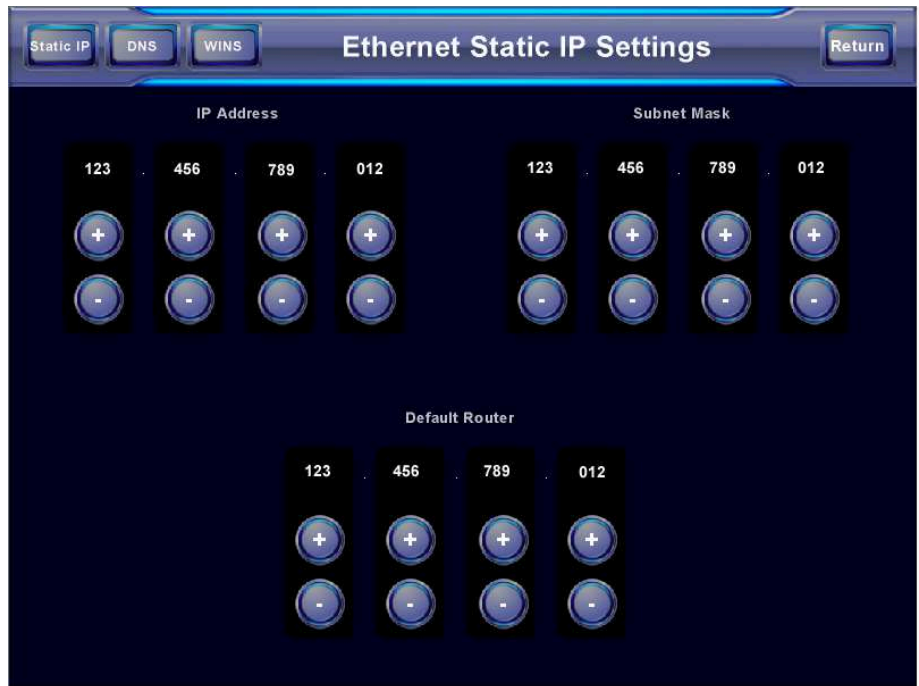
Touch **Ethernet** on the “Setup Menu” to open the “Ethernet Setup” menu. This menu provides buttons for **Ethernet Status Test** (for details such as the IP Address, Subnet Mask, Default Router, IP Table), *DHCP Enable/Disable* and *Static IP Options*. Each of the *Static IP Options* has its own menu, as shown in the illustrations on the following pages. The **Enable/Disable Ethernet** feature is provided on the “Interface Menu”. Ethernet settings are made through Crestron Toolbox. Refer to the TCP/IP Communications in the “Establishing Communication” section on page 44 for additional Ethernet setup details.

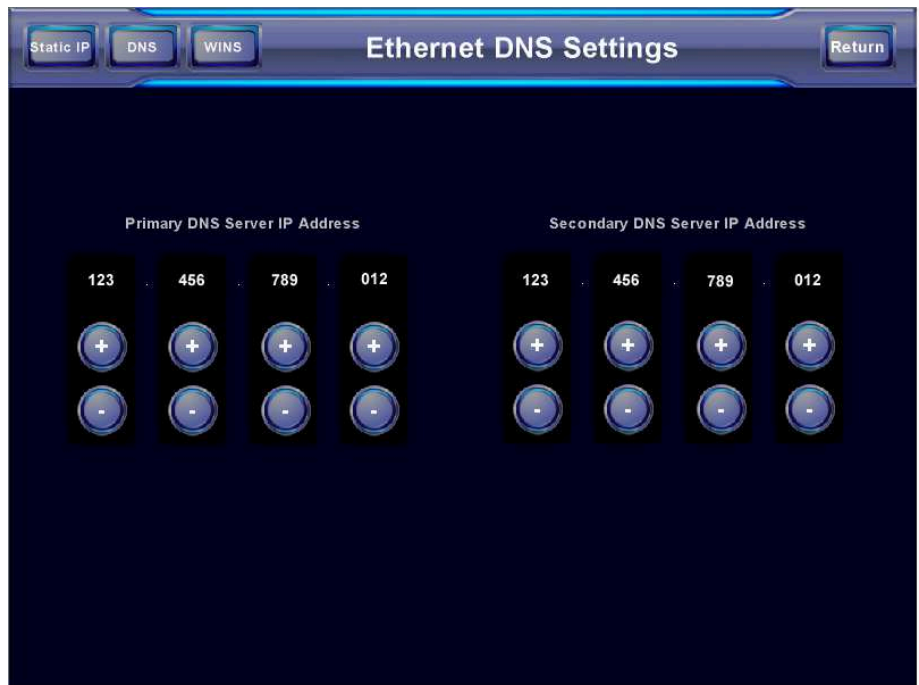
“Ethernet Setup” Menu (Static)



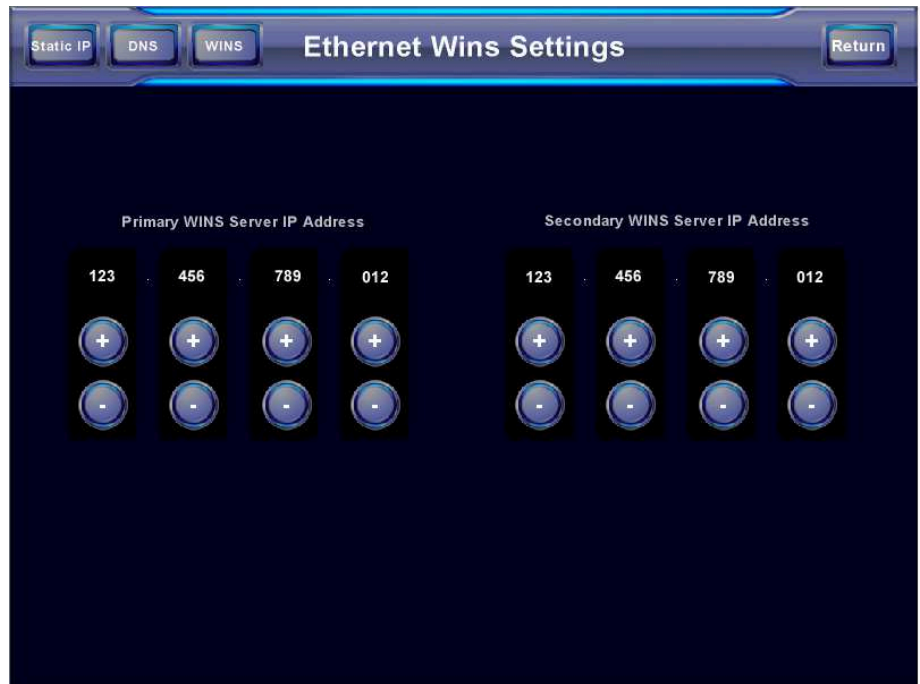
“Ethernet Static IP Settings” Menu



“Ethernet DNS Settings” Menu

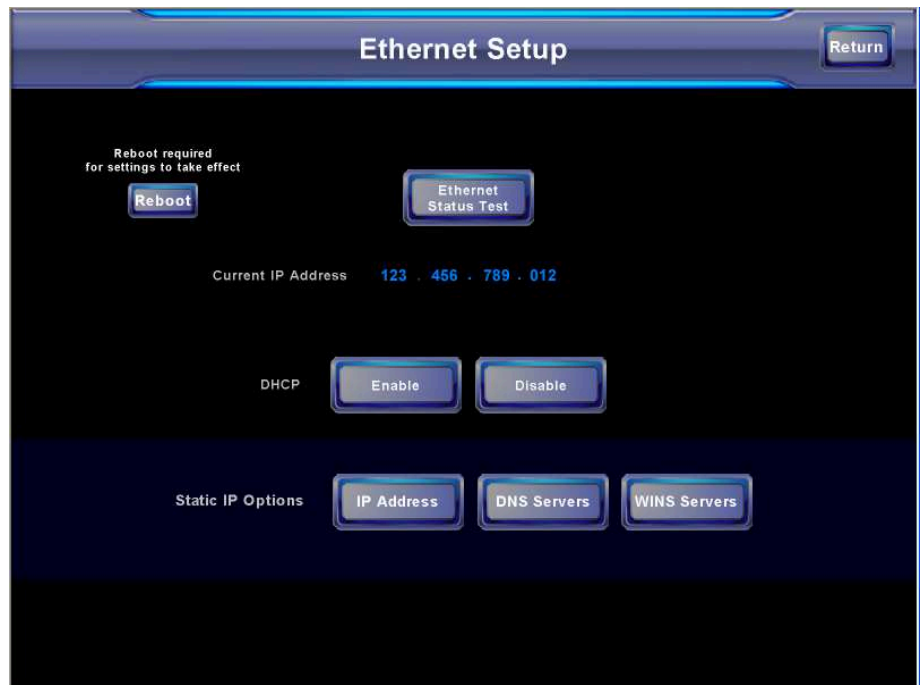


“Ethernet Wins Settings” Menu

RS-232 Menu

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB interface allows for one of four RS-232 communication modes:

- **Console** (loading DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB interface projects and firmware)
- **Touch Output** (communication of touch coordinates to an external device)
- **Mouse Input** (allowing a mouse to control the interface)
- **External Touch Input** (allowing another device to control the interface)

For convenience, the “RS-232 Menu” console port mode also permits the selection of the RS-232 communication options, *Baud Rate*, *Data Bits*, *Stop Bits*, *Parity*, *RTS On/Off* and *XON-XOFF On/Off*.

Touch the *RS-232 Port Mode* communication option to select communication parameters and then touch **Return** to save the RS-232 settings and return to the Setup Menu, if additional changes are intended. Touch **Reboot** to save the settings and restart the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB if no other changes are required.

Default settings: console mode, baud rate: 115200, data bits: 8, stop bit: 1, parity: none, RTS off and XON/XOFF off.

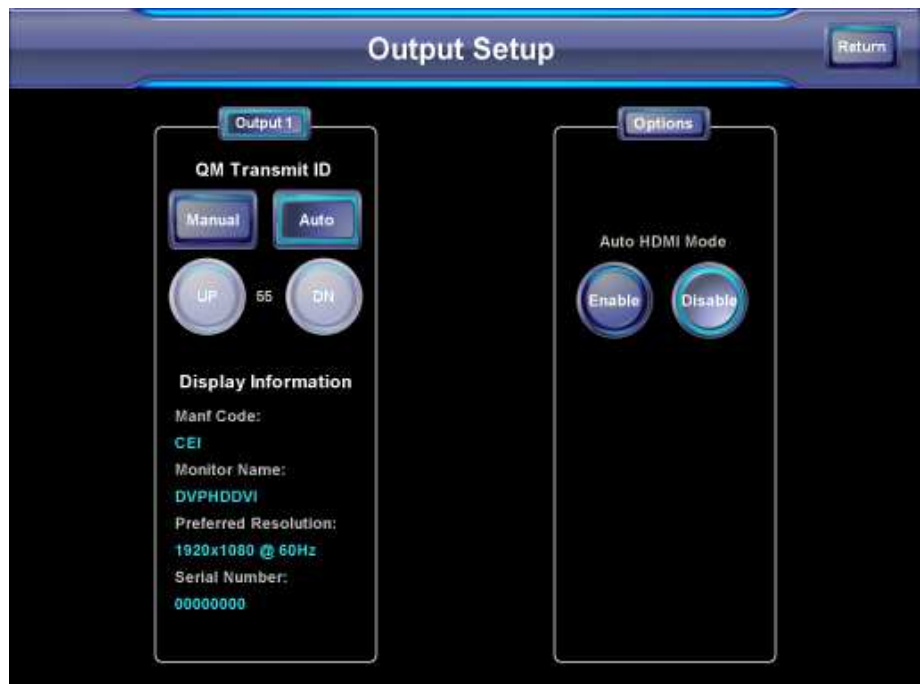

Output Setup

To open the “Output Setup” screen, touch **Output** on the “Setup Menu”. The “Output Setup” screen offers *QM Transmit ID* controls as well as EDID (Extended Display Identification Data) information on the DVI display attached to the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB.

NOTE: EDID information is only displayed for EDID compliant display devices.

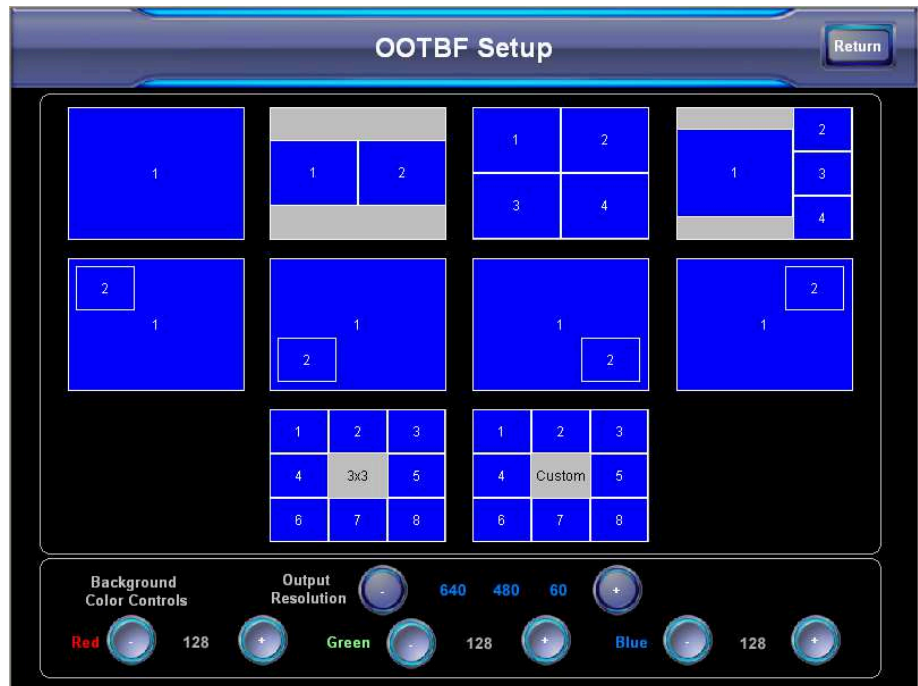

OOTBF Setup

Each configuration, accessed by clicking on the sample graphics, is individually customizable for *Source*, *Transition Effect*, *Transition Duration*, *Z-Order* (if applicable), *Position and Size* (if applicable), *Preview Window Aspect Ratio*, *Output Resolution*, *Window Color*, *Text Color* and *Text Justify*. **Maintain Aspect Ratio** and **Active** buttons are provided, as are **Apply** and **Cancel** buttons to confirm or reject any changes.

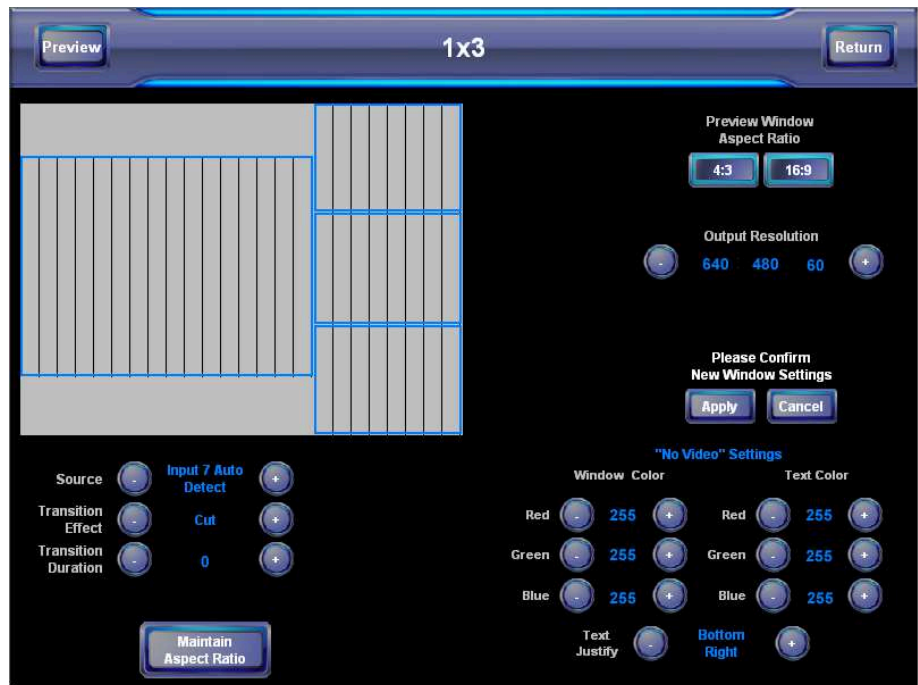

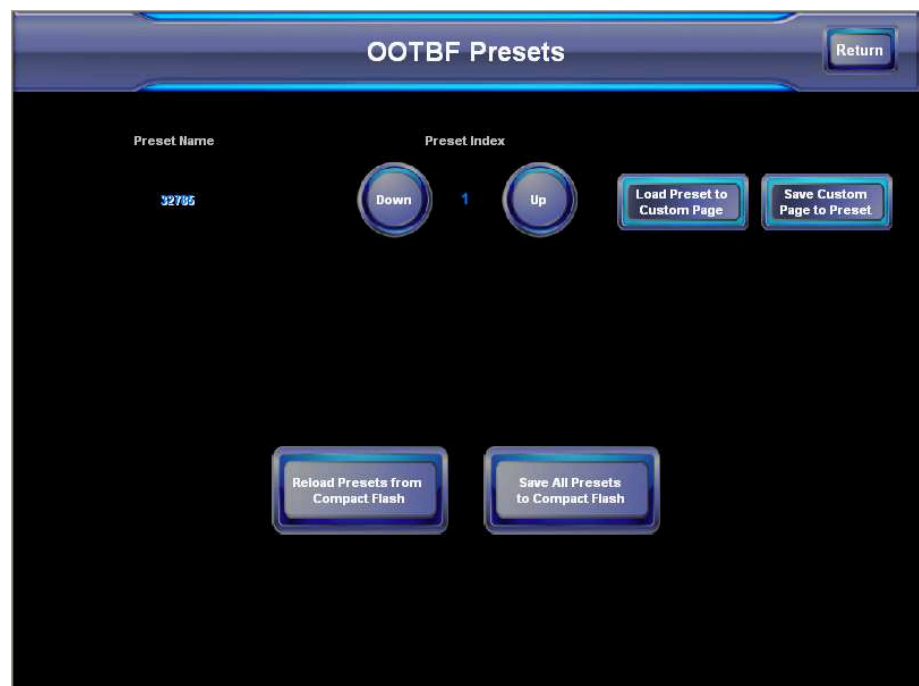

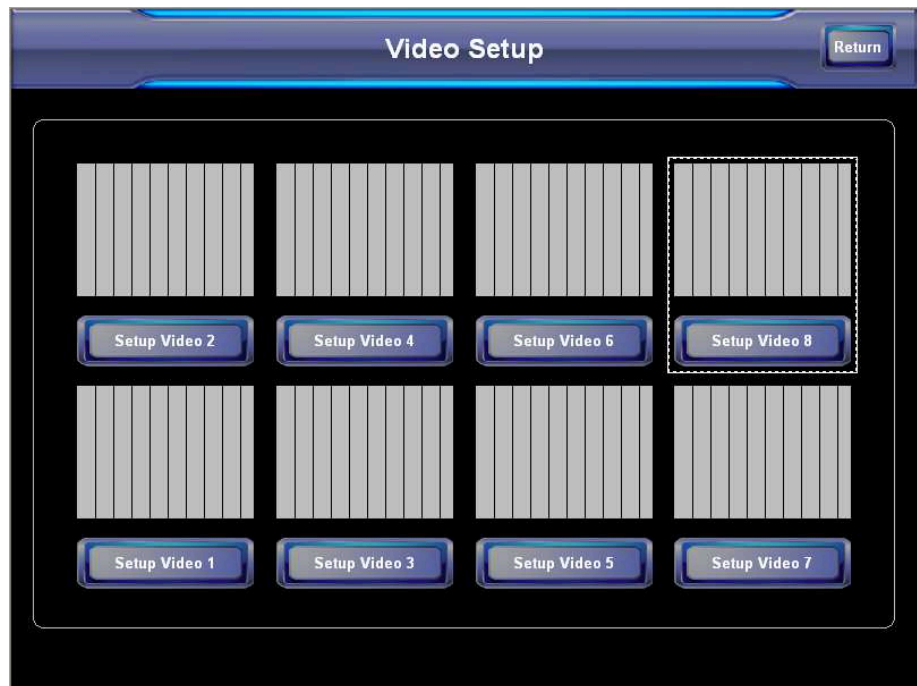

Video Setup

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can display up to eight fully scalable and movable full motion video windows, each supporting DVI, HDMI, SDI, HD-SDI, RGB, component, S-video and composite video signals from external AV and computer sources. These units also use auto-detect for DVI, HDMI, SDI, RGB, component, S-video and composite video. They support NTSC/PAL interlaced video; HDTV up to 1080i/1080p; DVI/HDCP, HDMI/HDCP and RGB up to WUXGA. Up to eight video inputs provide signals that can be routed to DVI, HDMI, SDI or RGB, plus RGB via QM.

A table describing the video menu controls follows the illustrations. Touching **Video** on the “Setup Menu” opens the “Video Setup” menu shown on the following page. From here, the user can enter the setup menus for any of the eight video inputs by touching their respective buttons.

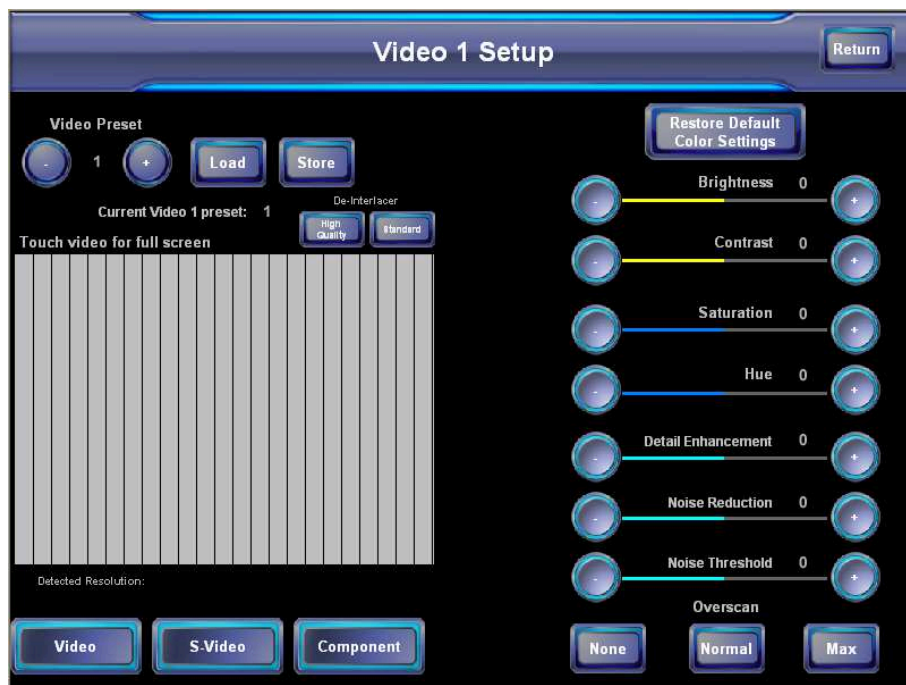

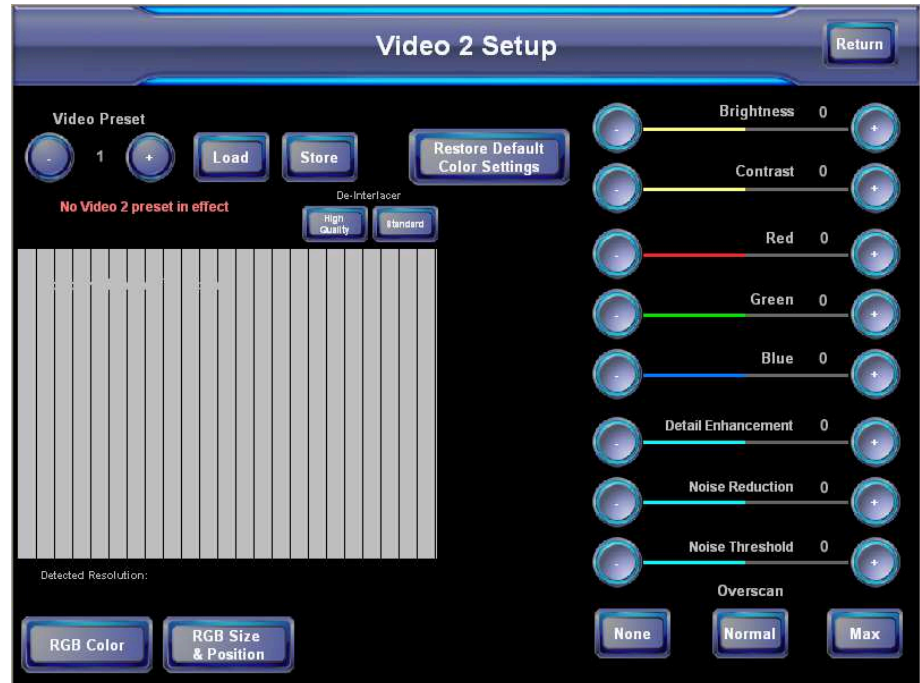

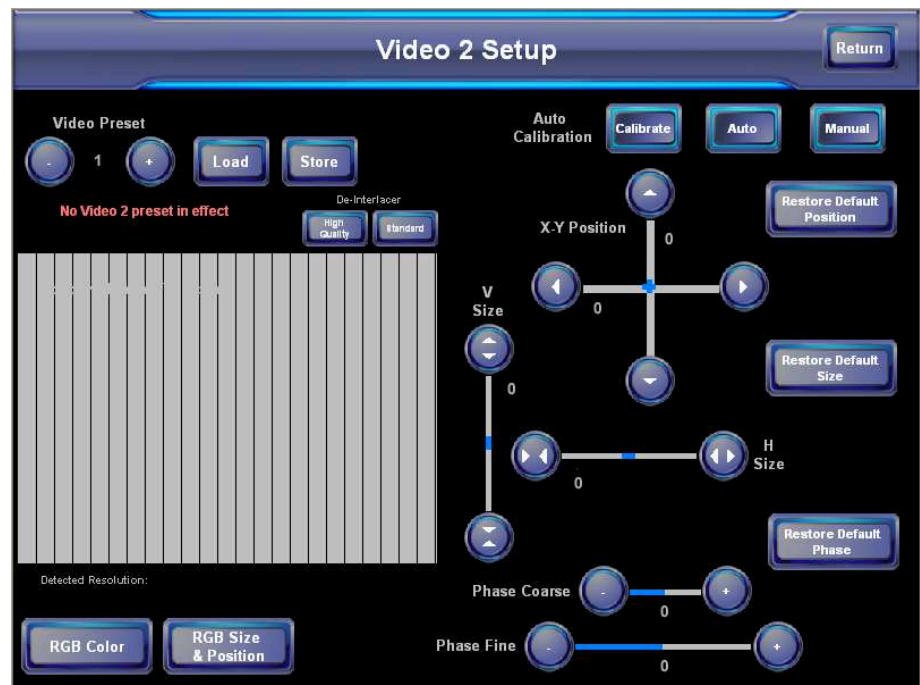

“Video 2 Setup” Screen (RGB Color shown)



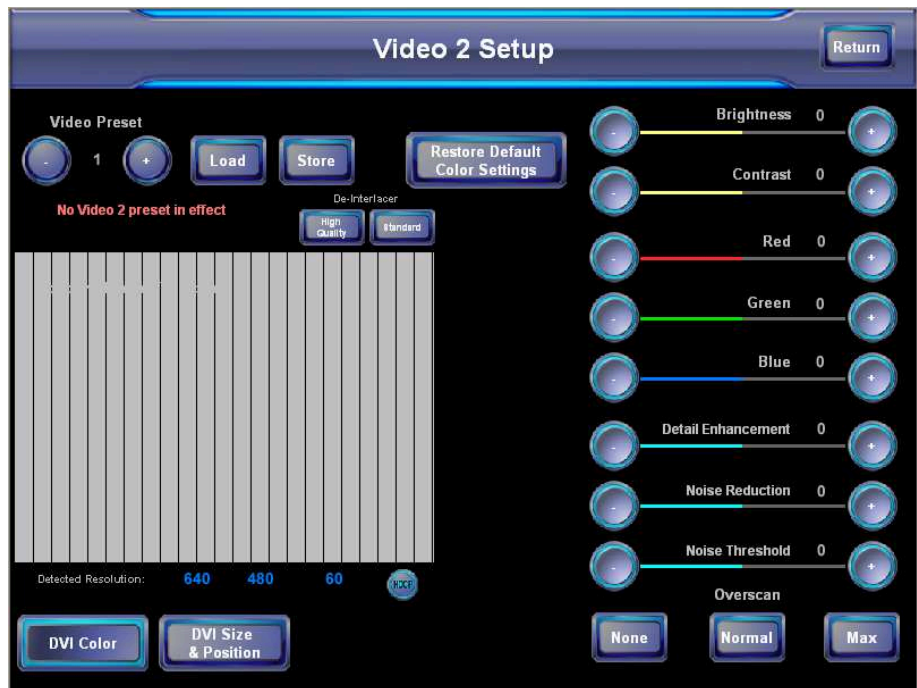

“Video 2 Setup” Screen (RGB Size and Position shown)

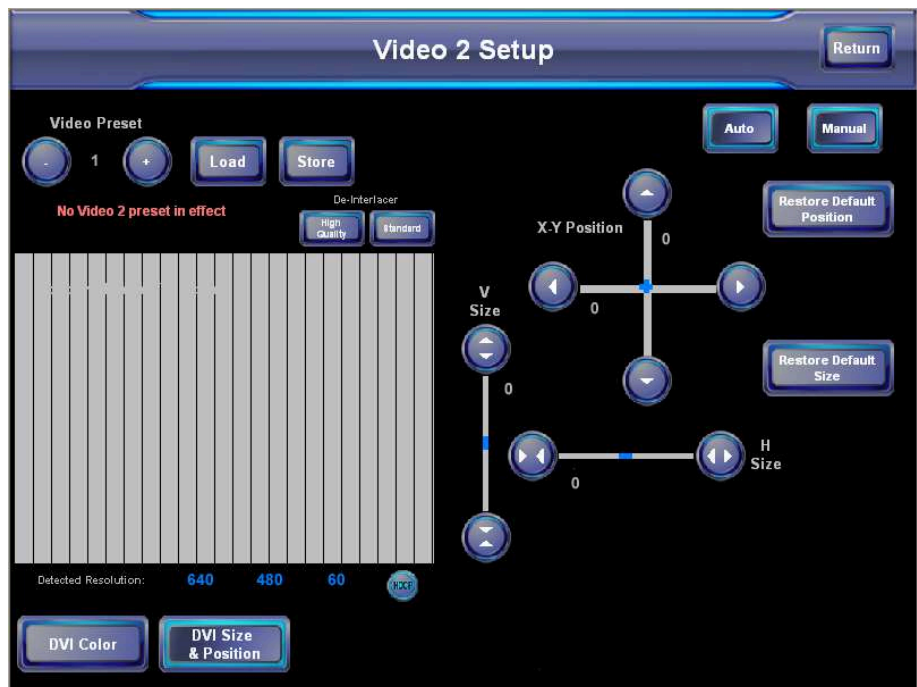

“Video 2 Setup” Screen (DVI Color Controls shown)

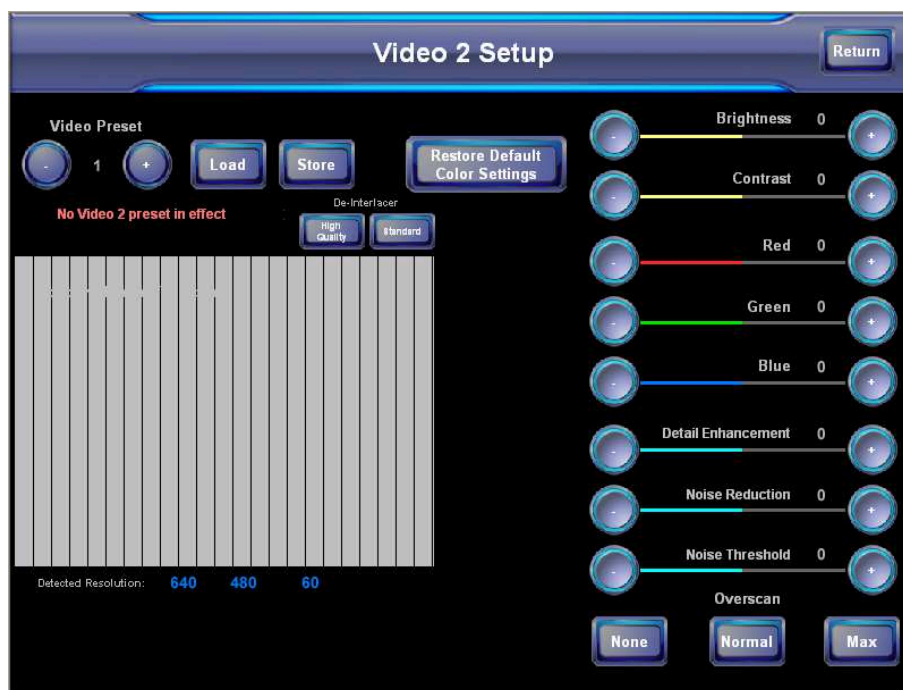


“Video 2 Setup” Screen (DVI Size and Position Controls shown)

QM Input Setup

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can display up to four full motion QM video inputs on inputs 2, 4, 6 and 8. These inputs auto-detect the video resolution while the video type can be selected from the “QM Setup” menu.

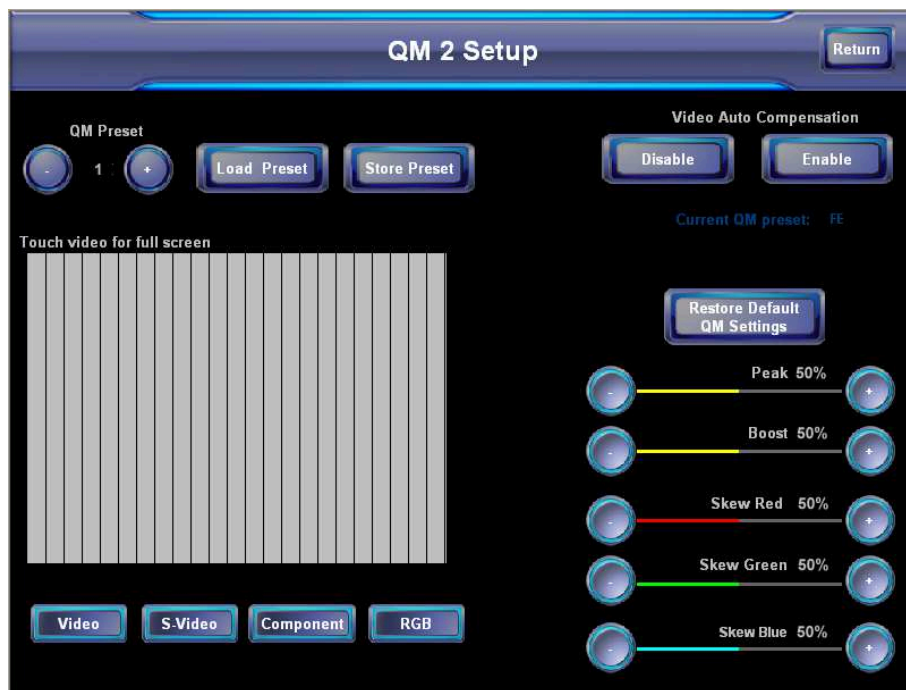

Diagnostics

To open the “Diagnostics Menu”, touch **Diagnostics** on the “Main Menu”. The “Diagnostics Menu” offers a series of buttons for various diagnostic tools. These tools should only be used under the supervision of a Crestron customer service representative during telephone support. A detailed discussion of the options available from the “Diagnostics Menu” is beyond the scope of this manual.

Installation

Ventilation

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB should be used in a well-ventilated area. The venting holes should not be obstructed under any circumstances.

To prevent overheating, do not operate this product in an area that exceeds the environmental temperature range listed in the table of specifications. Consider using forced air ventilation and/or incrementing the spacing between units to reduce overheating. Contact with thermal insulating materials should be avoided on all sides of the unit.

Rack Mounting

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can be mounted in a rack or stacked with other equipment. Two “ears” are provided with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB so that the unit can be rack mounted. These ears must be installed prior to mounting. Complete the following procedure to attach the ears to the unit. The only tool required is a #1 or a #2 Phillips screwdriver.

WARNING: To prevent bodily injury when mounting or servicing this unit in a rack, observe the following guidelines:

- When mounting this unit in a partially filled rack, load the rack from the bottom to the top with the heaviest component at the bottom of the rack.
- If the rack is provided with stabilizing devices, install the stabilizers before mounting or servicing the unit in the rack.

NOTE: Observe the following guidelines when installing equipment in a rack:

- Elevated Operating Ambient Temperature - If installed in a closed or multi-unit rack assembly, the operating ambient temperature of the rack environment may be greater than room ambient temperature. Therefore, consideration should be given to installing the equipment in an environment compatible with the maximum ambient temperature (T_{ma}) specified by the manufacturer.
- Reduced Air Flow - Installation of the equipment in a rack should be such that the amount of airflow required for safe operation of the equipment is not compromised.
- Mechanical Loading - Mounting of the equipment in the rack should be such that a hazardous condition is not achieved due to uneven mechanical loading.
- Circuit Overloading - Consideration should be given to the connection of the equipment to the supply circuit and the effect that overloading of the circuits might have on overcurrent protection and supply wiring. Appropriate consideration of equipment nameplate ratings should be used when addressing this concern.
- Reliable Earthing - Reliable earthing of rack-mounted equipment should be maintained. Particular attention should be given to supply connections other than direct connections to the branch circuit (e.g., use of power strips)

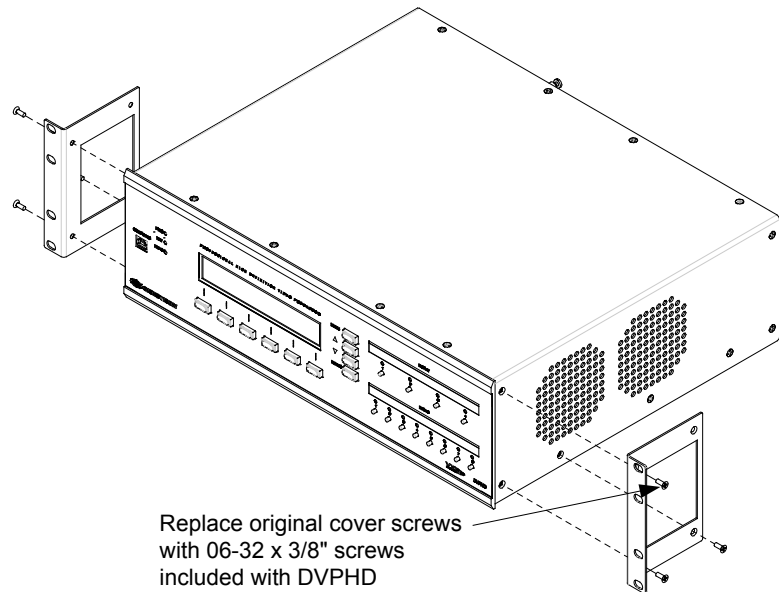
NOTE: If rack mounting is not required, rubber feet are provided for tabletop mounting or stacking. Apply the feet near the corner edges on the underside of the unit.

To install the ears:

CAUTION: To prevent equipment damage, use only the rack ears Crestron provides for this device.

1. There are screws that secure each side of the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB top cover. Using a #1 or a #2 Phillips screwdriver, remove the three screws closest to the front panel from one side of the unit. Refer to the diagram following step 3 for a detailed view.
2. Position a rack ear so that its mounting holes align with the holes vacated by the screws in step 1.
3. Secure the ear to the unit using three of the six included #06-32 x 3/8" rack mount screws included with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB, as shown in the following illustration.

Ear Attachment for Rack Mounting

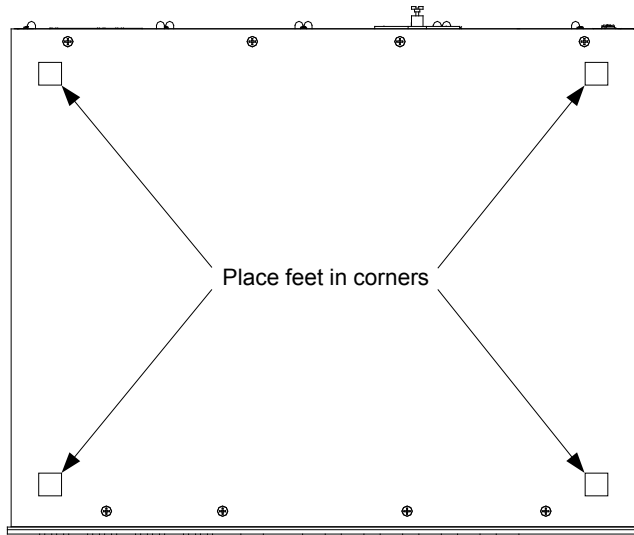


4. Repeat procedure (steps 1 through 3) to attach the remaining ear to the opposite side.

Stacking

Four "feet" are provided with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB so that if the unit is not rack mounted, the rubber feet can provide stability when the unit is placed on a flat surface or stacked. These feet should be attached prior to the hookup procedure. Refer to the following illustration for placement of the feet.

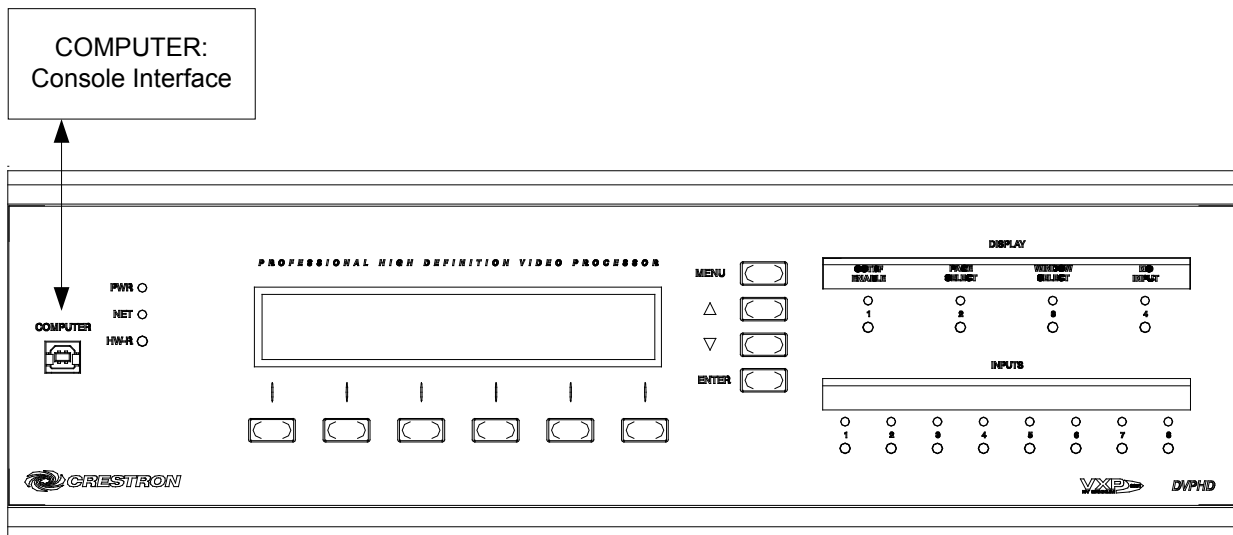
Connect the Device

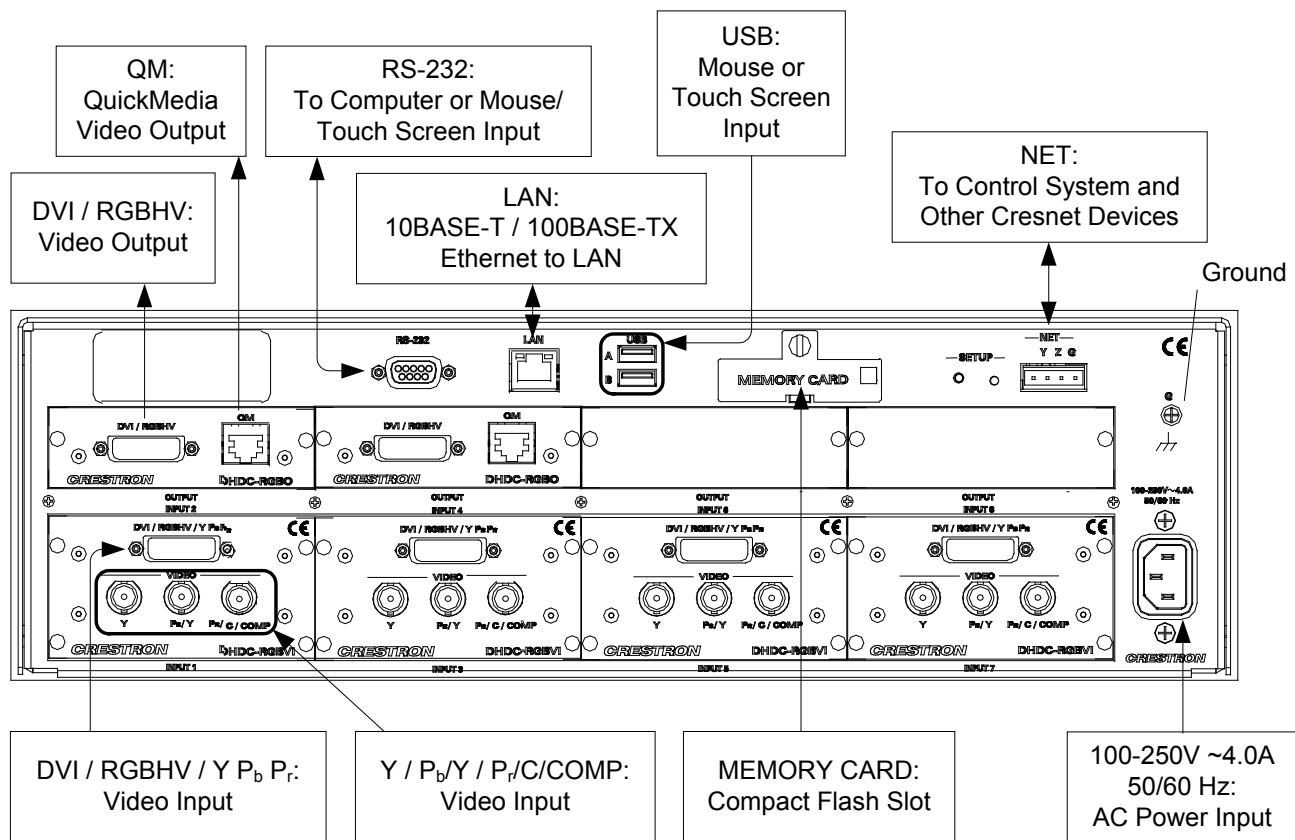
When making connections to the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB, note the following:

- Use Crestron power supplies for Crestron equipment.
- The included cable cannot be extended.

NOTE: Video input and output cards shown for illustrative purposes only. Please refer to their individual manuals for more information.

NOTE: Ensure the unit is properly grounded by connecting the chassis ground lug to an earth ground (building steel).

NOTE: The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can only be powered by the IEC male, main power input, which mates with the included removable cord. No power is supplied through the **NET** connector.

Label the Buttons

Use Crestron Engraver software to print custom labels for the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB’s front panel buttons and LEDs. Crestron recommends printing on 100-pound paper. Paper weighing less than 100 pounds tends to crumple while sliding in, while paper weighing more than 100 pounds may not fit.

Uploading and Upgrading

Crestron recommends using the latest programming software and that each device contains the latest firmware to take advantage of the most recently released features. However, before attempting to upload or upgrade it is necessary to establish communication. Once communication has been established, files (for example, programs, projects or firmware) can be transferred to the control system (and/or device). Finally, program checks can be performed (such as changing the device ID or creating an IP table) to ensure proper functioning.

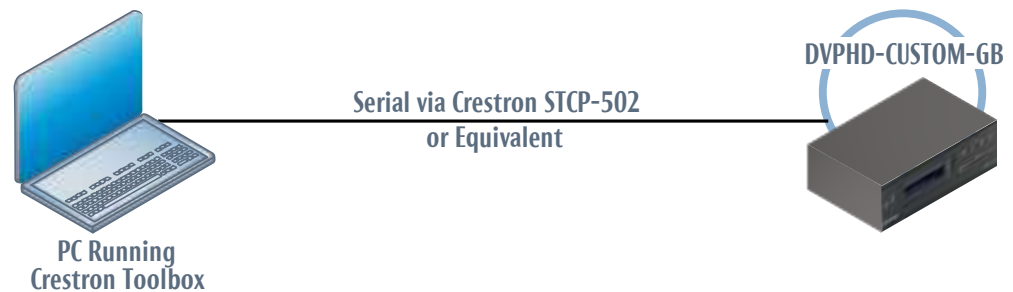
NOTE: Crestron software and any files on the Web site are for authorized Crestron dealers and Crestron Service Providers (CSPs) only. New users must register to obtain access to certain areas of the site (including the FTP site).

Establishing Communication


Use Crestron Toolbox for communicating with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB; refer to the Crestron Toolbox help file for details. There are four methods of communication: direct serial, indirect, USB and TCP/IP.

Direct Serial

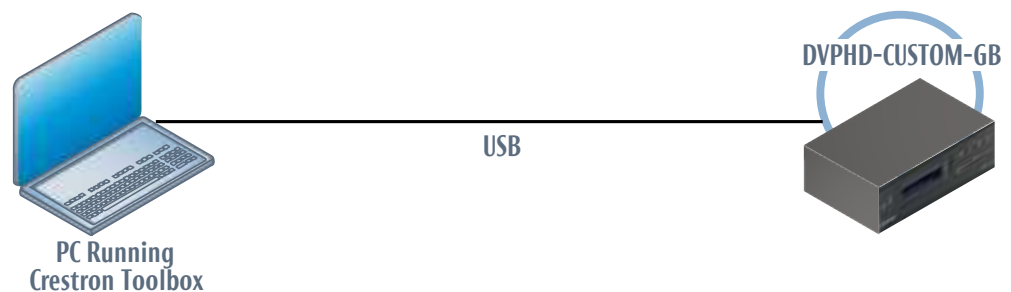
The **RS-232** port on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB connects to the serial port on the PC via a serial cable (Crestron STCP-502 or equivalent):

1. Click **Tools | System Info**.
2. Click the  icon.
3. For *Connection Type*, select *RS-232*.
4. Enter the following parameters: *Port: COM, Baud Rate: Auto-detect, Parity: None, Data Bits: Eight, Stop Bits: One*. The *XON/XOFF* checkbox should not be checked. The *RTS/CTS* checkbox should be checked.
5. Click **OK**. Communications are confirmed when the device information is displayed.

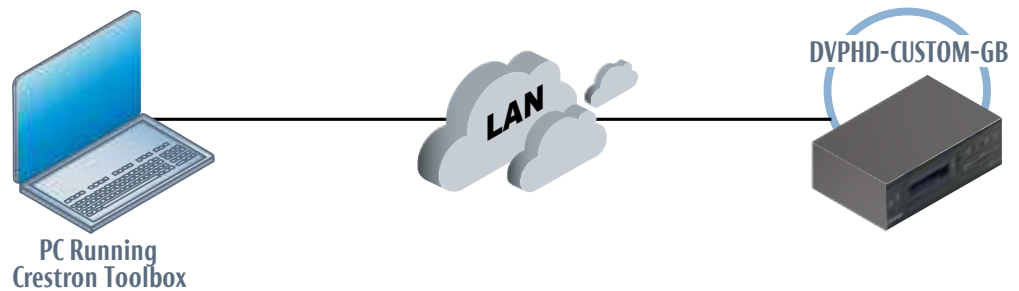

1. Click **Tools | System Info**.

3. For *Connection Type*, select *USB*. When multiple USB devices are connected, identify the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB by entering "DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB" in the *Model* text box, the unit's serial number in the *Serial* text box or the unit's hostname (if known) in the *Hostname* text box.
4. Click **OK**. Communications are confirmed when the device information is displayed.

TCP/IP**Ethernet Communication**

The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB connects to PC via Ethernet:

1. Use the Device Discovery Tool (click the  icon) in Crestron Toolbox to detect all Ethernet devices on the network and their IP configuration. The tool is available in Toolbox version 1.15.143 or later.
2. Click on the DVPHD to display information about the device.

Programs, Projects and Firmware

Program, project or firmware files may be distributed from programmers to installers or from Crestron to dealers. Firmware upgrades are available from the Crestron Web site as new features are developed after product releases. One has the option to upload programs and projects via the programming software or to upload and upgrade via the Crestron Toolbox. For details on uploading and upgrading, refer to the Crestron Studio help file, SIMPL Windows help file, VT Pro-e[®] help file or the Crestron Toolbox help file.

**Crestron Studio /
SIMPL Windows**

If a Crestron Studio (or SIMPL Windows) program is provided, it can be uploaded to the control system using Crestron Studio (or SIMPL Windows) or Crestron Toolbox.

Crestron Studio / VT Pro-e

Upload the Crestron Studio (or VT Pro-e) file to the touch screen using Crestron Studio (or VT Pro-e) or Crestron Toolbox. If loading a project to a DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB equipped with an external Compact Flash slot, please use Crestron Toolbox.

Firmware

Check the Crestron Web site to find the latest firmware. (New users may be required to register to obtain access to certain areas of the site, including the FTP site.)

Upgrade DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB firmware via Crestron Toolbox.

1. Establish communication with the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB and display the “System Info” window.
2. Select **Functions | Firmware...** to upgrade the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB firmware.

Program Checks

Actions that can be performed on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB vary depending on whether it is connected via Cresnet or Ethernet.

Cresnet Connections

For Cresnet connections, using Crestron Toolbox, display the network device tree (**Tools | Network Device Tree**) to show all network devices connected to the control system. Right-click on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB to display actions that can be performed on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB.

Ethernet Connections

For Ethernet connections, using Crestron Toolbox, display the “System Info window

(**Tools | System Info**) and select the **Functions** menu to display actions that can be performed on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB.

Be sure to use Crestron Toolbox to create the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB IP table.

1. Select **Functions | IP Table Setup**.
2. Add, modify or delete entries in the IP table. The DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB can have only one IP table entry.
3. A defined IP table can be saved to a file or sent to the device.

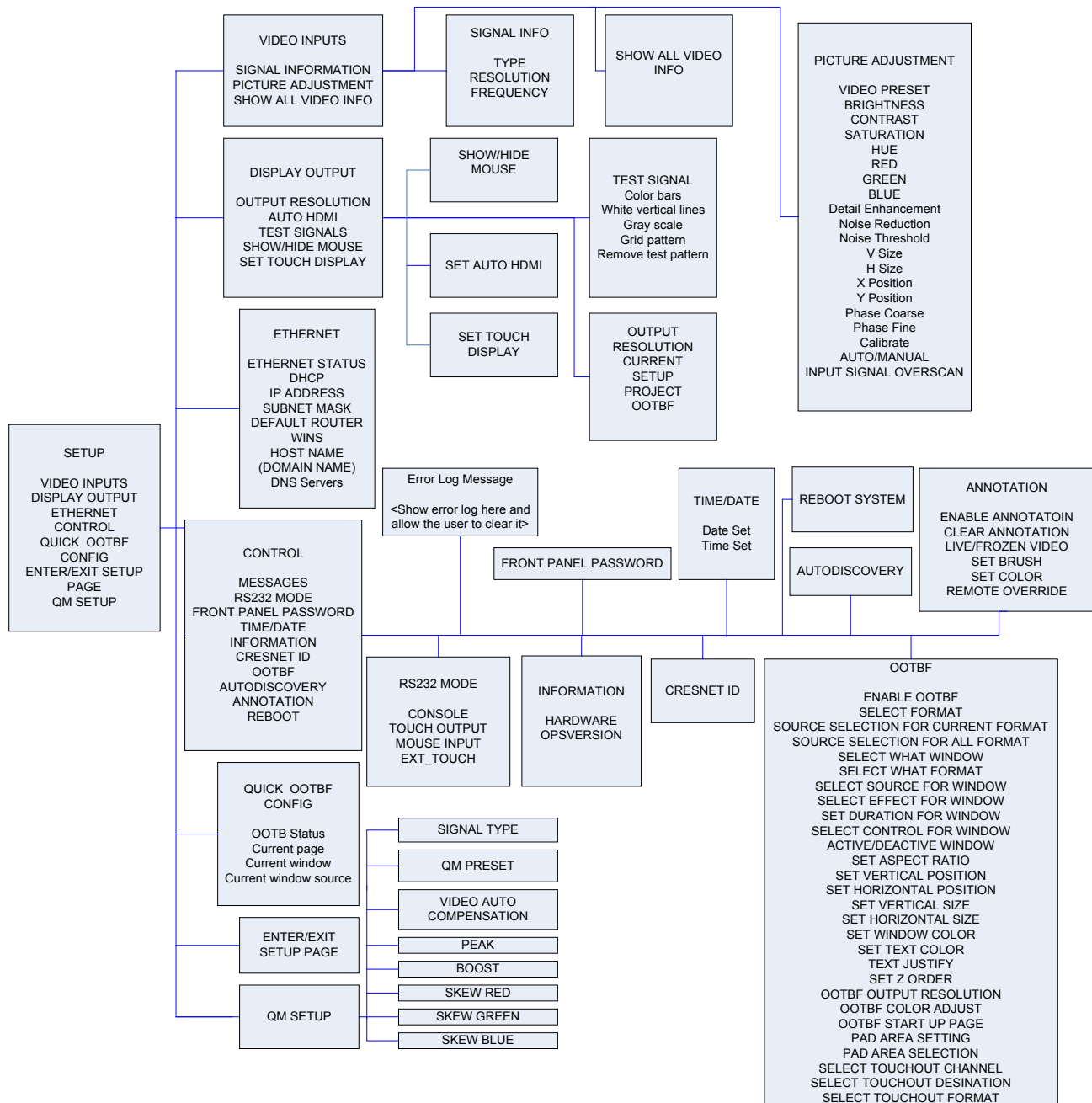
Edit the control system's IP table to include an entry for the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB. The entry should list the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB's IP ID (specified on the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB's IP table) and the internal gateway IP address 127.0.0.1.

Operation

The out-of-the-box functionality built into the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB allows it to be operated from the front panel by means of the buttons and LCD display. The following sections describe the available functionality and menu structure.

The overall front panel menu structure of the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB is shown in the following illustration. Subsequent paragraphs describe the individual pages and their functions.

Default Screen

The Default screen is displayed when the DVPHD-CUSTOM-GB has booted up, if the unit has not been locked or password protected.

Default Screen (Unlocked)

The device, firmware version, date and time are listed across the top of the screen. Each input and the type of video detected is listed beneath. To scroll through the list of inputs press **B7** and/or **B8**.

If the front panel is locked, the following screen is displayed.

NOTE: For information on setting the password, refer to “FRONT PANEL PASSWORD” on page 63.

Default Screen (Locked)

To unlock the front panel, press **B9 (ENTER)**. The “UNLOCK CODE” screen shown below, is displayed.

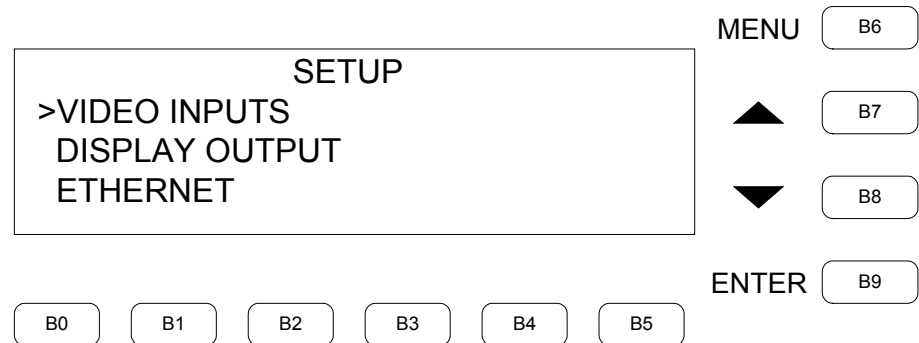

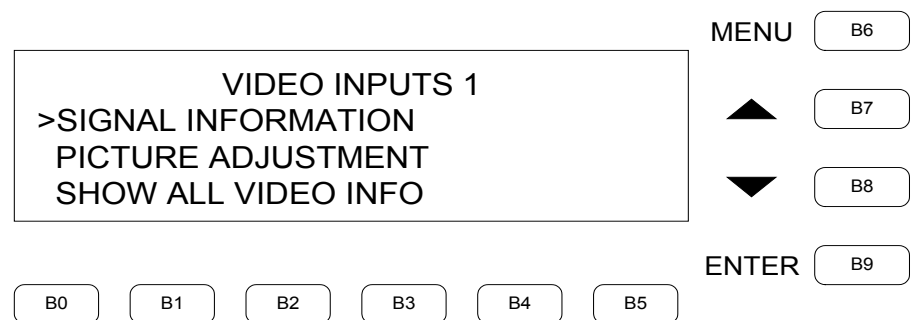


The SETUP menu provides access to five other menus: “VIDEO INPUTS”, “DISPLAY OUTPUT”, “ETHERNET”, “CONTROL” and “QUICK OOTBF CONFIG”. Press **B7** or **B8** to scroll through the selections. Press **B9 (ENTER)** to open the selected menu.

VIDEO INPUTS

The “VIDEO INPUTS” menu shows the current input on the first line. Other active inputs can be selected by pressing the appropriate input button to the right of the display.

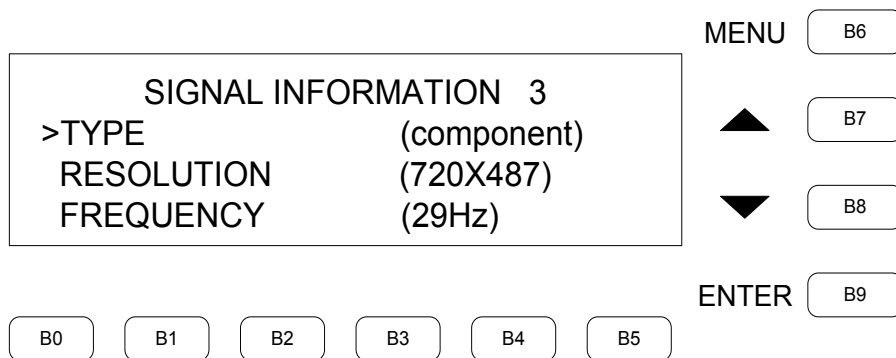

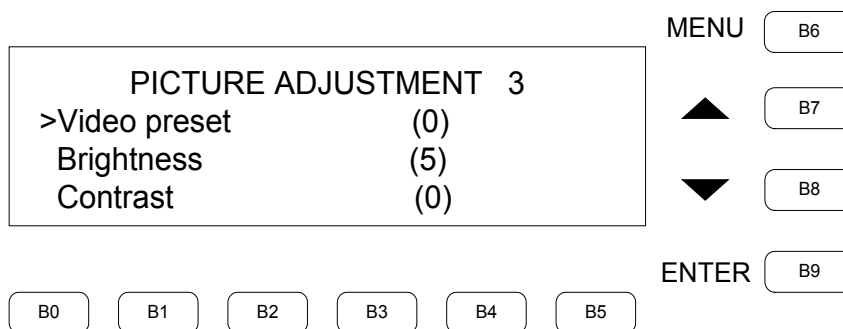
PICTURE ADJUSTMENT

The “PICTURE ADJUSTMENT” menu allows setup of *Video preset*, *Brightness*, *Contrast*, *Saturation*, *Hue*, *Detail Enhancement*, *Noise Reduction*, *Noise Threshold* and *Overscan* on non-RGB signals. On RGB, DVI and SDI signals, *Saturation* and *Hue* are replaced by *Red*, *Green* and *Blue* controls. RGB and DVI signals add *V Size*, *H Size*, *X Position*, *Y Position* and *Auto/Manual* controls. In addition, for RGB signals, there are *Phase Coarse*, *Phase Fine* and *Calibrate* controls.

Select active input by pressing the appropriate input button to the right of the display. Press **B7** or **B8** to scroll through the selections. Press **B9 (ENTER)** to open the selected screen.

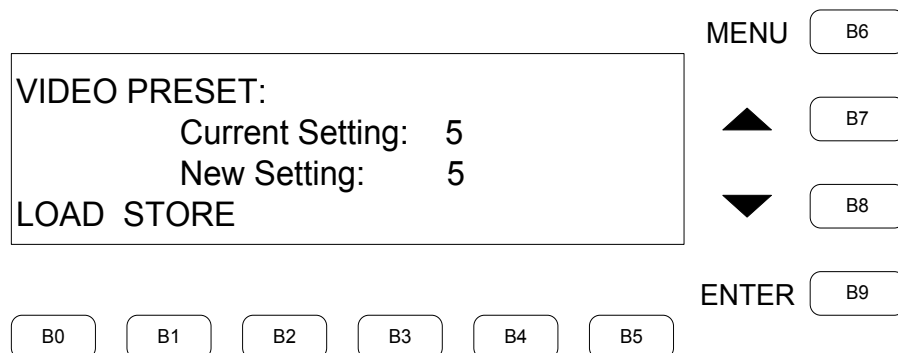

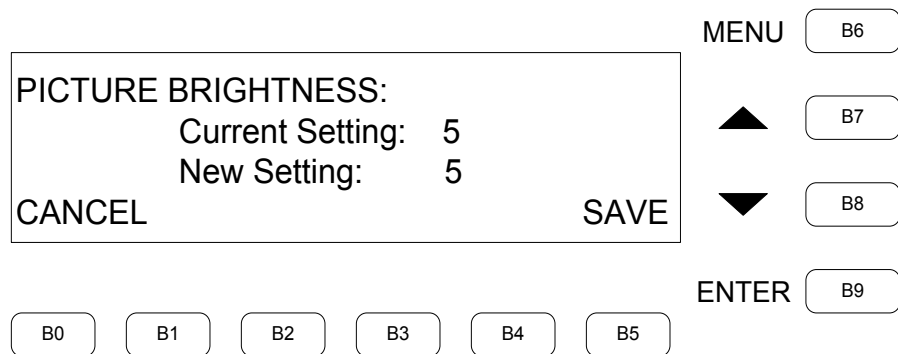

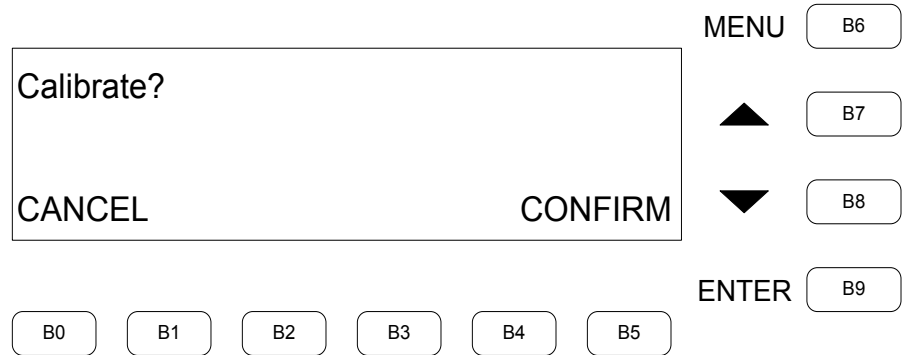

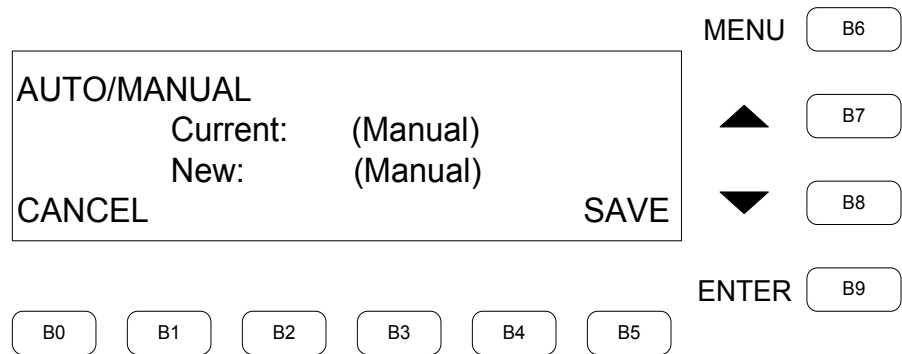

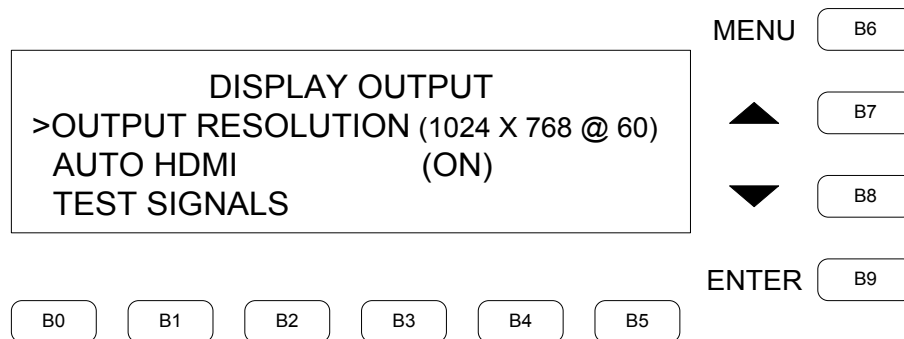

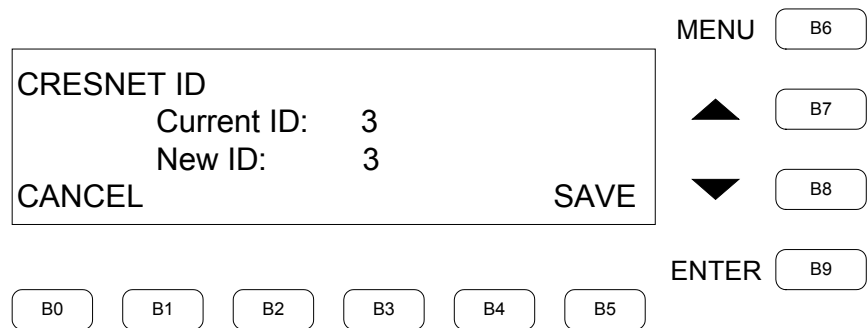

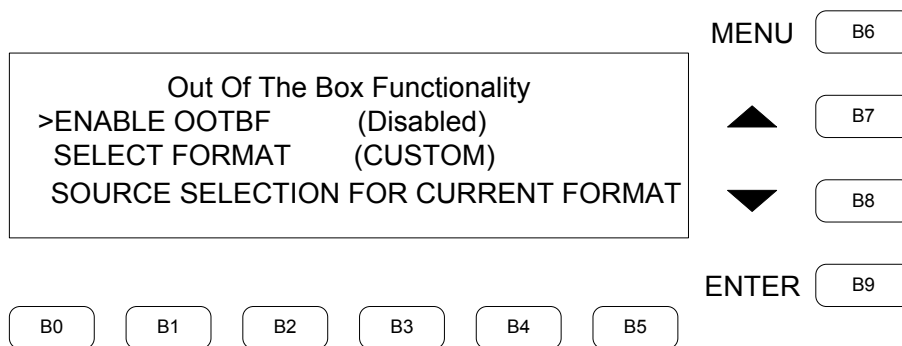

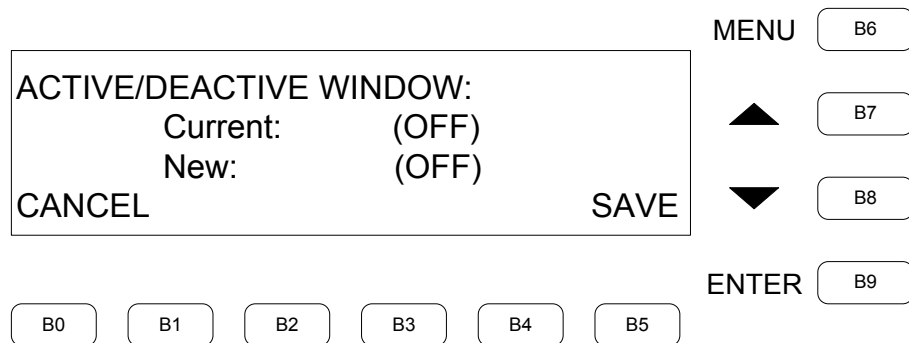

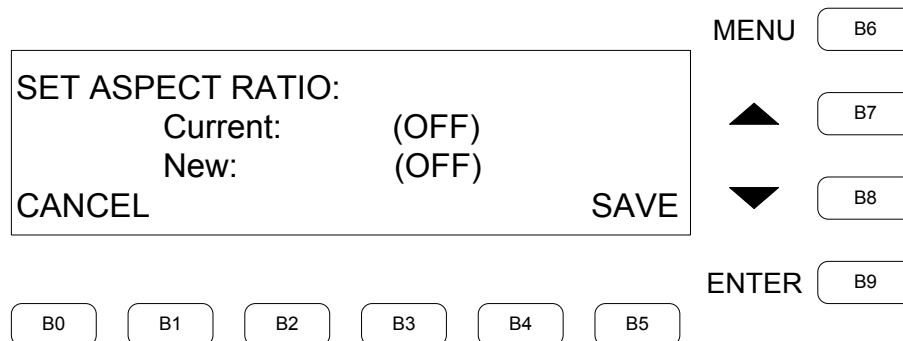

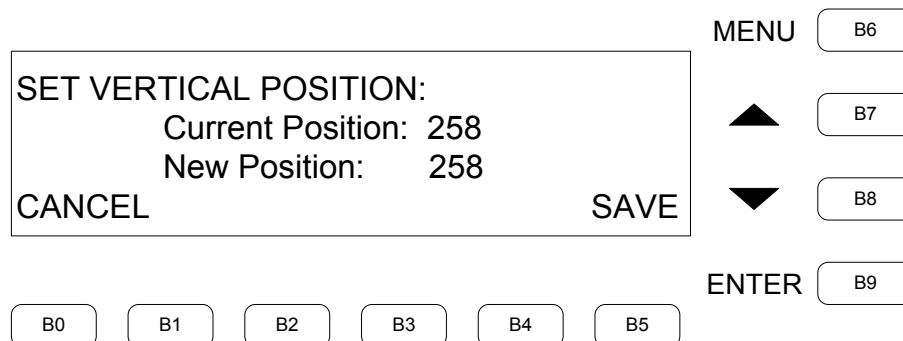

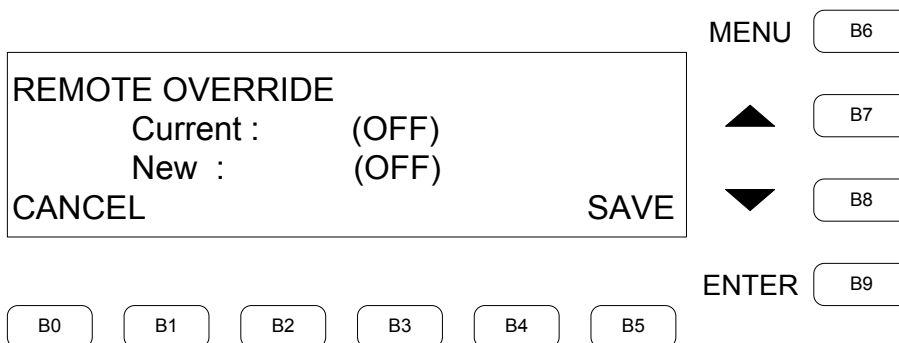

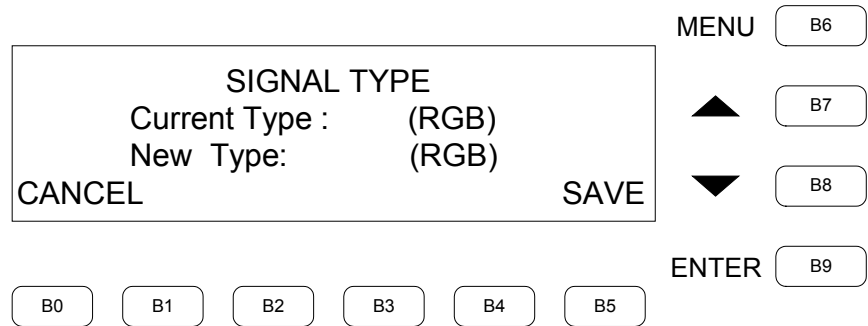

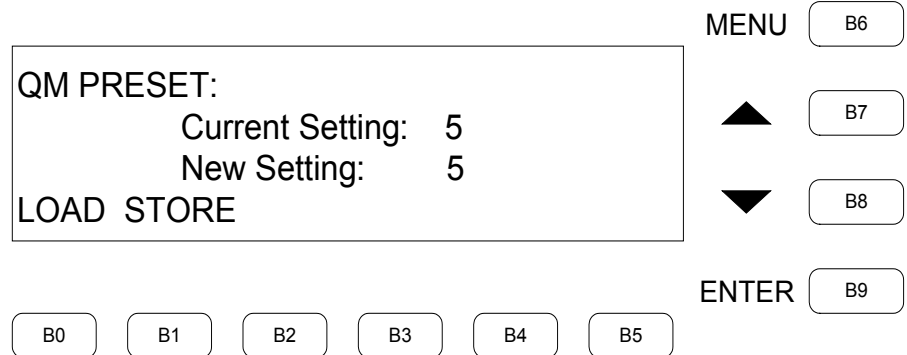

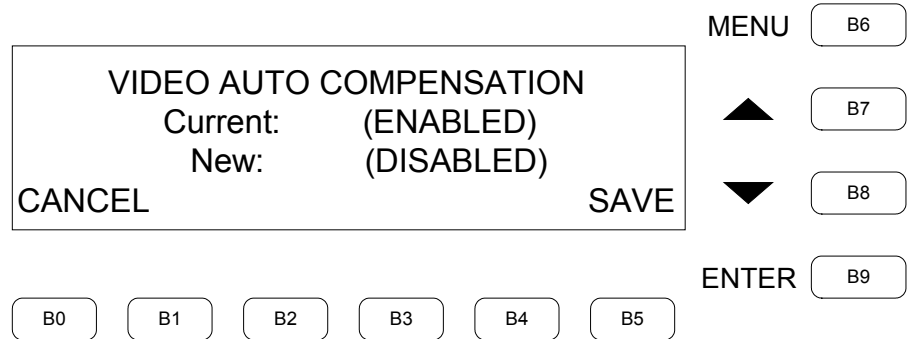

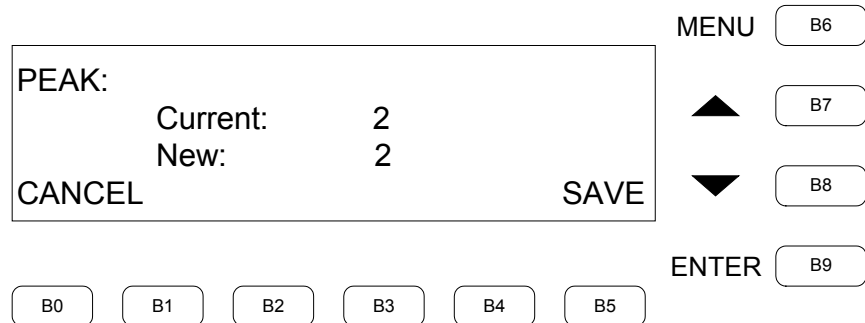

Check Network Wiring

Use the Right Wire

To ensure optimum performance over the full range of the installation topology, use Crestron Certified Wire only. Failure to do so may incur additional charges if support is required to identify performance deficiencies because of using improper wire.

Calculate Power

CAUTION: Use only Crestron power supplies for Crestron equipment. Failure to do so could cause equipment damage or void the Crestron warranty.

CAUTION: Provide sufficient power to the system. Insufficient power can lead to unpredictable results or damage to the equipment. Please use the Crestron Power Calculator to help calculate how much power is needed for the system (www.crestron.com/calculators).

When calculating the length of wire for a particular Cresnet run, the wire gauge and the Cresnet power usage of each network unit to be connected must be taken into consideration. Use Crestron Certified Wire only. If Cresnet units are to be daisy chained on the run, the Cresnet power usage of each network unit to be daisy chained must be added together to determine the Cresnet power usage of the entire chain. If the unit is run from a Crestron system power supply network port, the Cresnet power usage of that unit is the Cresnet power usage of the entire run. The wire gauge and the Cresnet power usage of the run should be used in the following equation to calculate the cable length value on the equation's left side.

Cable Length Equation

$$L < \frac{40,000}{R \times P}$$

Where: L = Length of run (or chain) in feet
 R = 6 Ohms (Crestron Certified Wire: 18 AWG (0.75 mm²))
 or 1.6 Ohms (Cresnet HP: 12 AWG (4 mm²))
 P = Cresnet power usage of entire run (or chain)

Make sure the cable length value is less than the value calculated on the right side of the equation. For example, a Cresnet run using 18 AWG Crestron Certified Wire and drawing 20 watts should not have a length of run more than 333 feet (101 meters). If Cresnet HP is used for the same run, its length could extend to 1250 feet (381 meters).

NOTE: All Crestron certified Cresnet wiring must consist of two twisted pairs. One twisted pair is the **24** and **G** pair and the other twisted pair is the **Y** and **Z** pair.

Strip and Tin Wire

When daisy chaining Cresnet units, strip the ends of the wires carefully to avoid nicking the conductors. Twist together the ends of the wires that share a pin on the network connector and tin the twisted connection. Apply solder only to the ends of the twisted wires. Avoid tinning too far up the wires or the end becomes brittle. Insert the tinned connection into the Cresnet connector and tighten the retaining screw. Repeat the procedure for the other three conductors.

Add Hubs

Use of a Cresnet Hub/Repeater (CNXHUB) is advised whenever the number of Cresnet devices on a network exceeds 20 or when the combined total length of Cresnet cable exceeds 3000 feet (914 meters).
